DEMONSTRATION FARM'S FAME IS SPREADING

The Great Northern Railway has come to be recognized as a pioneer in farm demonstration work. The latest recognition comes from the Los Angeles, California, branch of the National Back-to-the-Land Association, which recently wrote to Louis W. Hill, Chairman of the Great Northern Board of Directors, asking for facts and figures on this subject. This association, it is announced, will seek at the next session of the California legislature to have a bill passed placing demonstration farms in various parts of the state where they are so much needed. The letter is from George Eakins of Ocean Park, California, who had read of the wonders accomplished by the northwestern farmers as the result of the demonstration farms which James J. Hill has established along the line of the Great Northern Railway from the Mississippi Valley to the Pacific Coast. Some astounding facts and figures from the Great Northern demonstration farms were sent to Mr. Eakins, and California no doubt will soon be deriving the benefits of state demonstration farms.
