Vital Statistics for September.

County Health Officer Dr. F. W. Prentice has made his monthly report on the vital statistics of the county as follows:

Births, 43, of which 23 were males and 18 females. The males were born in the following places: Coburg, 1; Cottage Grove, 5; Dorena, 1; Eugene, 12; Junction City, 2; Latham, 1; Walker, 1. The females were born in the following localities: Coburg, 1; Cottage Grove, 2; Dorena, 1; Eugene, 9; Junction City, 3; Saginaw, 1; Springfield, 1.

The deaths were as follows:
Coburg—Males, 21 years, tuberculosis. Females, 45 years, apoplexy.
Cottage Grove—Males, 33 years, accident. Females, 79 years, old age.
Eugene—Males; 21 years, tuberculosis; 8 days, feeble vitality; 42 years, auto accident; 76 years, heart disease; 57 years, apoplexy; 59 years, heart disease; 53 years, cancer; 86 years, senility; 21 years, tuberculosis; 1 year, and 7 months, cholera infantum. Females: 38 years, cancer; 27 years, pneumonia; 79 years, dropsy.
Junction City—Male, 7 months, bowel complaint.
Lorane—Female, 79 years, dropsy.
Row River—Female, 69 years, cancer.

Springfield—Male, 67 years, heart disease; 76 years, heart disease; 40 years, Female, 62 years, cancer; 46 years, cancer.

The list of contagious diseases consists of three cases of scarlet fever in Eugene and one enteric fever each in Springfield and Cottage Grove.
