Note for Millage Bill Lumber 320 X Yes

It provides six-tenths of a mill tax for support of Agricultural College and University of Oregon, giving them permanent support and taking them out of the State's pocket. It also provides one Board of Agents, thus solving the problems of cooperation, consolidation, division of labor and economy of management.

It does not increase the average rate of taxation.

It repeats the \$500,000 University appropriation bill.

The Bill is endorsed by Governor West: "This Bill is in the interest of good business and should pass."
