Mines are Producing Abundance of Ore.

Mrs. S. E. Blair, 215 West Park Street South, returned last Wednesday from a three weeks' stay on the mining claim that she and her husband have in the Bohemia mountain range, lying southeast of Cottage Grove about 20 miles, says the Portland Journal. Commenting on conditions, Mrs. Blair said:

"Portland has millions of dollars of mining wealth, lying at its very doors to be developed, and it is not doing a thing to help get things started. There are hundreds of poor men down in there owning claims they have proved up and who are waiting only for the starting of a smelter in order to begin mining their product. The mines produce in abundance high quality gold and silver ore. Much of the ore is base ore and requires a cyanide smelter. Much of this base ore is worth more than \$500 a ton. In great quantities, too, there is free milling gold ore hardly any of which is worth less than \$300 a ton. There are a couple of small stamp mills in the vicinity to crush this latter variety of ore, but engineers there told me that half of the metal was being lost on the dump pile because the process was not carried out far enough."

Mrs. Blair, who conducted a hotel in that section for many years, made the trip up to the mines, which are above 6,000 feet in elevation, on horseback and on foot, for a distance of over 17 miles. She is more than 60 years old and it was the first time that she had ever made a trip of this kind, over the very roughest of mountain trails.
