NORTHERN LANE LADS AGAIN TROUNCE GROVE

Medley, Damewood, Martin and Brumbough Are Stellar Performers for Home Team

The football game Friday afternoon between Junction City high school and the Cottage Grove high school, played at Junction City, resulted in a victory for the Junction City boys by the score of 7 to 0. The scoring was done in the second quarter when G. Strome, after making two successful line plunges for 10 yards each, made a third line buck for 10 yards more and a touchdown. Hays kicked the goal from a difficult angle, thus making the score 7 to 0, which stood till the end.

During the first three quarters the play was mostly in the Cottage Grove territory, but in the last quarter the play was about equally divided, part in Junction's and part in Cottage Grove's.

Considering the muddy condition of the field the play was fast and exciting. Numerous forward passes were attempted by both sides, but without success. Quarterback Flint of the locals made the only sensational run when he circled the right end for 39 yards in the third quarter. Haliback Strome was the most consistent ground gainer for Junction. Thompson at full and Haus at end also played a great game.

Medley at quarter, Damewood at full and Martin and Brumbough at halves were the stellar performers for Cottage Grove.

Perman refereed and R. Jackson umpired the game, which was usually clean and free from unnecessary roughness.

This makes the second win for Junction City from Cottage Grove. Thus far this season Junction City has not been scored against.

The promoters of the scheme do not intend to trust the measure to the people, but to take it to the legislature, where they feel assured their wishes will be granted, as Eugene and other parts of Lane county do not object. That part of the county is so far removed from the county seat that people here feel it is entitled to a county of its own.

DIVISION BILL STILL IN DOUBT

RETURNS ON INITIATIVE AND REFERENDUM SLOW.

Latest Returns Show Millage Bill in Doubt.—Regent's Treatment of Agricultural School Hurts.

The general county division bill in which Cottage Grove is vitally interested is still in doubt. Late returns show it to be running ahead in Multnomah. Returns from sections of the state interested in county division, and also in the consolidation of cities provision incorporated in the measure, are hoped to give it a majority, but on initiative measure returns are meager.

A surprise is the fact that the millage bill and university appropriations, which were expected to sweep the state, are in doubt. The fact that one of the regents of the university used his newspaper for scurrilous attacks upon the Oregon Agricultural College is reported to have been the cause of a large negative vote.

Funeral services will be held today at Veatch's Chapel, after which the body will be taken to Brooklyn, Iowa, and interred in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. It will be accompanied by his wife and parents.

BULL MOOSE CANDIDATE IS 77 VOTES BEHIND PRESIDENT

County Division Bill Given Big Vote, Woman's Suffrage Carries City, University Measures Turned Down Because of Eugene Guard's Nasty Fight; Socialists Poll Strong Vote.

Cottage Grove has the honor of being one of the few cities in the state that gave Taft a plurality. He polled 20 more than Wilson and lead Roosevelt by 77. But for the fact that many voted for Wilson for fear that Teddy might win, the president might easily have secured a majority over his two nearest competitors.

Prohibition won by the magnificent majority of 116. Equal suffrage carried, Hawley received an almost unanimous vote for County Commissioner, G. F. King for representative was handsomely endorsed with a large complimentary vote, Railroad Com-

missioner Campbell was well remembered by his old-time neighbors. Selling for senator was a winner, Hawley for congress had little competition, Bryson had a handsome vote for Sheriff, B. F. Keeney showed up in old time form for Assessor, woman suffrage secured a plurality, single tax was snowed under, the general county division bill got 371 to 70. The negative vote was largely due to personal feeling against some of those supporting the bill. A majority favored capital punishment, the university appropriations were voted down as was also the

GROVE GETS INTO COURT HOUSE

FIRST TIME FOR TWENTY-FIVE YEARS.

Geo. M. Hawley Elected County Commissioner by Safe Majority.—Combination of Events Does It.

Cottage Grove has broken into the court house for the first time in twenty-five years, and has secured the position of greatest importance to this city, that of county commissioner.

Although the official canvass has not been made, Geo. M. Hawley has a safe lead and the election is conceded to him by his opponents.

Cottage Grove's solid vote for Hawley and the split in the Eugene district, are the factors that gave Hawley the job.

Not since the days when "Uncle Burn" Veatch was county commissioner over 25 years ago has the Grove been able to secure a county office, and never has it held any office but that of commissioner.

Feeling that this end of the county has received shabby treatment from the county seat in road matters, Grove voters feel that this victory is a glorious one.

COL. LAWSON DESIGNATED VICE INVESTIGATOR

Governor West Appoints Special Agent Upon Representations of Citizens of Klamath Falls.

Lieut.-Col. B. K. Lawson of this city was appointed special agent by Governor West last week to investigate reports made to the governor regarding vice conditions in Klamath Falls.

Should it happen that his investigations should disclose that there is a lack of enforcement of the bawdy house gambling, liquor and other laws it is safe to predict that the governor will descend on the town and clean it up. The governor is in possession of evidence showing that a policeman recently beat a newspaper man while Mayor Nicholas and Chief of Police Smith stood by without interfering. He is also in possession of evidence in the way of a document that Dr. L. L. Truax, city physician, has given a clean bill of health to a prostitute, and that the laws are not enforced by either city or county authorities.

The governor is in receipt of appeals also from the people of Plain View and Sico for the enforcement of the laws, and he is considering them. From Portland there has also come a number of complaints and it is expected that Special Prosecutor Esterly will in the near future bring a number of suits in that city under the nuisance statute.

Col. Lawson returned from Klamath yesterday, having made his report to the governor. As the report has not been made public, he would not speak for publication.

MADE STRONG PLEA FOR DRY CITY

J. FRANK BURKE OF PORTLAND DELIVERS ABLE ADDRESS.

I Would Rather My Boy or Girl Were Robbed of Life Itself Than of Sobriety, Says Speaker.

Declaring that he would rather his daughter were brought to him, her body mangled and bleeding, than to have her commit one of the sins that follow the saloon business; that he would rather his son were robbed of life itself than of his sobriety, J. Frank Burke of Portland delivered an able exposition of the dry city in the Armory Friday evening.

The speaker made a strong plea for temperance rather than delivering an exhortation of the saloon.

"I am against special license of any kind," Mr. Burke declared. "I do not believe that we should give a special license to four or five saloons in one city, any more than to four or five grocery stores or to a special few in any kind of business. The principle is wrong entirely."

Mr. Burke also contended that the government in granting a license to saloons was going into partnership with the saloonkeepers in the liquor business and became a party to violation of the law with the liquor seller, just as much as the official who agrees with someone to wink at a violation of the law.

Mr. Burke startled the audience with the statement that in Oregon a man can vote four years before he becomes a citizen. His reference to the time when ministers of the gospel toted booze to the brothers and when liquor was served on church property also caused surprise to younger members of the audience.

No doubt Mr. Burke's address had its effect on the election Tuesday.

TAKE ADVANTAGE OF LONELY WOMEN

Complaint Made That Men, Knowing Condition, Rob Orchard Operated by Fair Sex.

Claiming that because they are women, great, big, robust men take advantage of them and persistently rob their apple trees of the fruit, owners of an orchard on the Coast Fork road have reported the fact to The Sentinel for publicity. The story if true is one to arouse indignation.

The owners claim that ever since it began bearing the orchard has been looted, the looters even boasting of their deed. The first year every apple was taken. On one occasion a "big prosperous looking man" was seen to shake at least a half bushel from a tree although there were already many on the ground. This year the picked apples were left in the orchard several days and several bushels were removed from the boxes.

The complainants say: "Those looters are not small boys, as one might suppose, but great, big, strapping men of voting age, residents of Cottage Grove and vicinity, men whose wages for one day would buy several bushels of apples."

The women say they expect to use the law to protect their rights. That appears to be the proper course to pursue.

Other similar complaints have been made to The Sentinel. Appropriating the products of the soil apparently is not considered larceny.

ANGORA GOATS KILL OFF VARMINTS

Experiments in East May Show Oregon Farmers Methods of Protecting Flocks.

Dispatches from Pennsylvania tell of Angora goats that attack and kill mountain lions, and it is stated that a number of farmers are experimenting with them as a protector for sheep and other animals unable to withstand the attacks of the big mountain cats.

Oregon farmers have suffered considerable loss to their flocks from varmints. As the state is a natural home for the pugnacious Angora, it is likely that if the experiment proves successful elsewhere it will be adopted here. It would prove a cheap way of protecting live stock, as the goat itself pays a handsome profit on the mohair.
