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A SUMMARY OF IMPORTANT EVENTS

National, Political and Personal News Items Briefly Sketched.

For going about the city with their hat pins protruding, 50 women, most of them prominent society dames, have been tried and fined in one Sidney, N. S. W., court.

As a result of disorders and rioting at Jacksonville, Fla., in connection with the streetcar strike, Governor Gilchrist ordered out two regiments of state troops, comprising about 3000 men.

The German foreign office denies the report from Punta Arenas, Chile, that the Bremen is engaged in exploring and surveying in the Magellan straits with a view to the acquisition by Germany of a coaling place.

The Hotel Metropole in New York, from which Herman Rosenthal stepped to be shot to death last July, has been closed by creditors. The closing, according to George Considine, the manager, is directly due to the murder.

The first report of the comptroller of the Panama Pacific exposition shows that but \$2,325,000 of the signed subscriptions pledged for financing the exposition have been paid in. This is just a little over 38 per cent of the amount promised.

The Chinese government has decided to grant the demand of the "six powers" bankers and some of the foreign legations which protested against the intention of China to allot a portion of the salt tax revenue as a guarantee for the payment of the independent loan of \$50,000,000, made to China by the Crisp syndicate.

A system of graft in the commissary department of the navy, which may reach every ship in the Atlantic fleet, has been revealed by a secret investigation. Rear-Admiral Osterhaus reported to the navy department that the investigation has resulted in the confession of G. T. Davis, chief commissary steward of the battleship Louisiana.

People in the News

Cardinal John Murphy Farley, with a party of ecclesiastics with whom he will tour California, has arrived in San Francisco on his visit to the west.

H. E. Campbell and Joe P. Gavin, who, the police believe, are implicated in the \$200,000 bank robbery at New Westminster, Canada, were arrested at Columbus, Ohio.

Mayor Gaynor, in his first public utterance in the Becker case since the conviction of the former police lieutenant, declared he would retain Police Commissioner Waldo in office.

Richardson and Backstrum, two of the convicts who escaped from the Wyoming penitentiary at Rawlins on October 13, were killed by a posse near Powder Springs, on the Colorado-Wyoming line.

General Homer Lea, throughout the world famous as the personal adviser of Sun Yat Sen during the revolution in China and as the author of "The Valor of Ignorance," died at Ocean Park, Cal., after an illness that has been serious since his return from China last May.

With the dismissal at San Francisco of an indictment against Louis Glass, once vice president and general manager of the Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph company, by Superior Judge William P. Lawlor, the last of the alleged graft cases growing out of the Schmitz-Ruef regime is wiped out.

Balkan War News

Prince Alexis, cousin of King Peter of Bulgaria, is fighting as a private in a cavalry regiment.

Reports from Scutari state that the Montenegrins in one of their assaults against the town lost 2000 men killed and wounded.

The National Bank of Bulgaria has guaranteed the life insurance premiums payable to reservists who have joined the colors.

In order to avoid a bread famine, the Turkish government has released from military duty all the bakers who had been called up with the reserves.

Bulgarian aviators have made several flights over Adrianople and the latest authentic information is that the bombardment of the forts continues.

Horses are now practically unobtainable in Constantinople, \$250 being asked for lame ponies, and from \$400 to \$600 for anything that can carry a real load.

Eight aeroplanes ordered by the Bulgarian war office have been dispatched from Vienna. Austrian aviators will fly them until sufficient Bulgarian pilots are available.

Five Greek princes are at the front—the Crown Prince Constantine, in command of the army; Prince George, in command of the navy, and the Princes Andrew, Nicholas and George (sons of Crown Prince Constantine.)

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

Ralph Henry of Newport shot and killed a man named Dadds at Corvallis. Dadds is said to have alienated the affections of Henry's wife.

A bequest of \$10,000 for the Bible University of the Christian church at Eugene was left in the will of the late Thomas W. Phillips, of Newcastle, Pa. John Kilcourse, aged 73, a veteran of the Boer war and a British pensioner, was killed just at the outskirts of Eugene by being hit by a switch engine.

The importance of the growing of cover crops in orchards is emphasized in a recent bulletin on orchard irrigation issued by the Oregon Agricultural college.

Governor West designated Lieutenant Colonel B. K. Lawson of Cottage Grove to go to Klamath Falls and make an investigation of conditions which were said to exist there.

Ethel Davidson of Medford, 15 years of age, is the latest eligible for a Carnegie medal. She plunged into the cold waters of the Rogue and saved her aged father from drowning.

In a report of the Oregon Short Line the operating revenues are shown to be \$20,695,538, and operating expenses are \$10,340,612, or an operating income of \$9,161,136, after deductions. That the only qualification a woman has to vote in a school election is the owning of property in her own name is the substance of an opinion handed down by Assistant Attorney-General De Long.

Complying with a request made upon him by Governor West, A. W. Brown, of Portland, recently appointed by the governor as a member of the state board of pharmacy, has forwaded to him his resignation.

John Hawkins Simmons, a prominent pioneer of Marion county, died at his home in Woodburn on November 1, after a short illness. He was born in Fort Wayne, Indiana, in 1832 and crossed the plains by ox team in 1847.

For approximately \$400,000, a tract of yellow pine timber in Lake county comprising 20,000 acres, has been purchased by the Schroeder lumber company of Milwaukee, Wis., from the Oregon Land & Livestock company of Eugene.

Those who paid for space in the voters' pamphlet containing the initiative and referendum measures, will receive a refund of \$25 a page, as the cost of the pamphlet was this much below the amount estimated by the secretary of state.

Operating revenues of the Southern Pacific for the entire line totaled \$90,621,090 for the year ending June 30, according to a partial report for that company just filed with the state railroad commission. The total intrastate revenues for the state of Oregon were \$7,993,718.

Tracklaying operations on the Oregon Eastern railway, the new Harri-man trans-Oregon line now being built west from Vale, which were stopped two weeks ago on account of the shortage of motive power will be resumed within 30 or 40 days, says an official report received.

The body of an unidentified man the right hand still clasping a 38 calibre Smith & Wesson revolver and with a gaping wound in the right temple, was found in an empty house on the old Geiger donation land claim a mile and a half south of Cornelius. The man was about 43 years old and weighed 200 pounds.

An agreement expected to result in the annual exporting from Portland of \$1,000,000 worth of pure bred livestock to the new Chinese republic was reached at Portland by En Lung Hsieh, for the new republic, O. M. Plummer for the Portland Union Stockyards company, and O. M. Clark trustee of the chamber of commerce.

Death has claimed its third victim from the boiler explosion in the Salem Bank & Trust building of last Tuesday. I. B. Muchmore died Saturday as the result of injuries in the catastrophe. W. G. East, cashier of the bank, and Harry Ahlers, son of the president of the bank, were the first victims. Mr. East dying early Wednesday and Ahlers later in the day.

In a letter addressed to the state land board, Governor West has formally stated his intention of assigning H. M. Esterly, now special prosecutor in the governor's vice crusade in Portland, to the task of regaining for Oregon 50,000 acres or more of land alleged to have been fraudulently secured from the state in the famous Benson and Hyde operations. As soon as it can be arranged, Attorney Esterly will be relieved of his special work in Portland, which will be placed in other hands.

According to a statement filed with the clerk of the senate, Senator Bourne has received no contributions to his campaign fund and has spent only \$137, \$100 of which went to Secretary of State Olcott for space in the campaign book. The Bourne Popular Government club, however, reports having raised for the campaign \$9810. Ben Selling's statement to the clerk of the senate acknowledges contributions of \$3400 for his campaign. Dr. Harry Lane reports contributions of just \$40 and total expenditure of only \$75.

OREGON VOTE GOES TO WILSON

Roosevelt Will Gain Second Place on Complete Count of State is Belief.

Portland.—Woodrow Wilson, according to figures representing about one-half the vote in Multnomah county and one-fifteenth of the vote upstate, has carried Oregon, with Taft and Roosevelt contesting for second place.

For United States senator Jonathan Bourne has suffered a decisive defeat. According to early estimates he will run third, with Ben Selling and Harry Lane close contestants for first place. The earliest returns indicated that Bourne would carry Multnomah county and that Selling would have the state outside, but later reports showed Lane making unexpected gains. In Portland it is a close race between the three candidates, but in the state at large the closeness is between only Lane and Selling.

Bourne is defeated by 8000 to 10,000 votes, according to early indications. In the state outside of Multnomah county, Roosevelt and Taft are running neck and neck, with indications

that Taft will maintain a slight lead. Roosevelt's plurality over Taft in Multnomah county of 2000 to 3000 indicates, however, that Roosevelt will gain second place in the complete count. If the present ratios shown in the early returns are maintained, Wilson will have a plurality over Roosevelt in Oregon, complete, of about 8000.

In many counties no returns were available on initiative measures, but those that reported on woman's suffrage were almost invariably favorable. It is indicated by the meager returns that the measure will have an affirmative majority of about 8000.

Single tax has been snowed under. The returns uniformly show a decisive majority against the graduated tax amendment and the probabilities are that it has been defeated by 50,000.

WASHINGTON FOR T. R.

Bull Moose Carry State by 30,000, But Governorship in Doubt.

Seattle.—Roosevelt has carried Washington by probably 20,000 plurality over Wilson. The Progressive state chairman claims 45,000; the Democratic chairman concedes 20,000.

Roosevelt has carried with him to victory the two Progressive candidates for representatives in congress at large, J. A. Falconer and J. W. Bryan.

Robert T. Hodge, Progressive candidate for governor, may have been beaten in the race for governor. It is believed that all the other candidates on the Progressive ticket have been elected.

In the race for governor, Lister, Democrat; Hodge, Progressive and Hay, Republican, are running almost together and the result is in doubt.

Roosevelt carried King county by a plurality of not less than 6000, on the face of incomplete returns with probably one-fifth of the vote in. The feature of the election, aside from the unexpectedly strong run of the National Progressive ticket, was the slashing of Robert T. Hodge, the Progressive candidate for governor.

At Democratic headquarters Lister's election is claimed by a plurality of 10,000.

California For Wilson.

San Francisco.—Wilson and Marshall seemingly have carried California. Indications of Democratic victory appearing from a rough survey of the situation, cleared to a definite certainty with the tabulation of returns from 1520 state precincts out of 4372. The totals gave Wilson 90,355, Roosevelt 85,258, Taft 662 and Debs 11,020. This ratio, if maintained in the still untabulated precincts, should give Wilson a plurality in the state of about 15,000.
