More Females than Males.

Twelve males and 25 female babies were born in Lane County during the month of October, according to the statistics compiled by the county health officer, Dr. F. W. Prentice.
Of the males one was born in Cottage Grove, one in Elmira, nine in Eugene and one in Portola. One female was born in Blue River, three in Coburg, four in Cottage Grove, one in Elmira, 15 in Eugene and one in Springfield. The deaths were as follows: Cottage

Grove--Males, 80 years, heart disease; one month, inanition; 62 years, kidney disease; 73, heart disease; 63, stomach trouble; 68, apoplexy; and 52, malignant jaundice. Females, 81 years, apoplexy; 77, heart disease.
Coburg--Females, 52, gastric hemorrhage; 39, tuberculosis.

Eugene--Males, 22 years, gun shot wound; 62, apoplexy. Females, 48 years, cancer of stomach; 77, pneumonia; 29, accidental death; one month, bowel trouble.

Franklin--Male, two years, dysentery. Florence--Male, no age given.

Row River--Female, two years, tubercular peritonitis.

Wendling--Male, 82 years, senile debility.

Eugene--Five scarlet fever and one enteric fever.

Oakridge--Three cases enteric fever. Springfield, Dexter, Treat and Zion--One case each, enteric fever.

Mrs. Sallie Applegate Long, an Oregon pioneer, died at her home near Yoncalla October 31, 1912, aged 64 years and eight months. She was the third daughter of the late Hon. Jesse Applegate, the "sage of Yoncalla."
Mrs. Annie Jennie Hill of Yoncalla died Oct. 27th at Red Bluff, Calif., at the age of 67. She came west with her husband in 1870.

Halloween Fortunes Told by the Lucky Candle Game.



There are many time honored ways of peeping into the future on Halloween, such as paring apples, roasting chestnuts, the apple seed game and many more, too numerous to mention. All are supposed to foretell with more or less accuracy what the future holds in store for the players. Perhaps the lucky candle game is as good a fortune teller as any other.

For this game provide a large tub of water and small candles for those who wish to try their luck. The candles are mounted on bits of wood by means of a pin or thin nail driven through it. Each player then launches his little boat, and the candles are all lighted as quickly as possible. The owner of the candle that burns the longest will be the luckiest guest of the party. The good luck is supposed to remain with the fortunate winner for the ensuing year.

HAILSTORM DAMAGE.

It may enable the orchard owner who has a valuable crop of fruit on the trees to sleep more soundly if he remembers that a destructive fall of hail rarely accompanies night thunder storms. Whether this is due to the fact that the night air for some distance from the earth is of more uniform temperature than it is during the day after the sun has warmed it it would be difficult to say, but the fact noted has been verified in the experience of many a farmer and agriculturist. One season several years ago before the writer got on to this fact he lay awake of nights during a stormy spell with 500 barrels of apples on the trees and held his breath the while for the fear that hail would ruin the crop. The one destructive storm that he does remember, that made mosh out of apples, pecked holes in green pumpkins, shredded cabbage and practically ruined a fine acre of onions for him--half in the windrows--came at 10:30 in the forenoon.

FUNNY FRILLED LIZARD.

Carries an Umbrella, Has a Whip Tail and Walks Like a Bird.
The frilled lizard is found in Australian woods, being tolerably abundant in north Queensland and the Kimberley district of Western Australia. It lives on beetles such as are found on the tree barks. It is about three feet long, measured from head to tail point. What makes it remarkable consists of two things--its hurried walk and its fighting anger.
It carries a sort of natural umbrella top about its neck, which it elevates suddenly with an alarming effect even to ordinary lizard killing dogs, scaring them as an umbrella opened in the face of a charging bull; hence it is called the frilled lizard. Its teeth are not of much use as a defense against a vigorous animal, but when it fights it uses its long, lithe tail in a way to bring long bruises on one's hands--in fact, could it be properly trained, it might serve as an automatic switch, which, like the magic rub-a-dub-dub stick, would at the word administer a thrashing to the disobedient child.
