OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout
the State During the Past
Week.

Rainbow Region County.

Hot River.—The Oregon-Washington Navigation & Transportation company has filed suit against Hot River county to have the county quit work on the railroad right of way around Hot River mountain where Governor West has placed a force of convicts to construct a grade connecting Hot River with Multnomah county with a wagon road, and which was intended as a line to the proposed Pacific highway from the western section of the state through central Oregon and on to California.

Moscow Appeal Denied by Department.—(Moscow)—Word has been received by Governor West from the interior department that the appeal of J. E. May against the commission of the general land office in the case of the reservoir for the Deschutes land company has been denied, and that the granting of a site for the reservoir must await the investigation of the government as to the status of that company.

LEGISLATURE IS REPUBLICAN

Returns Show They Elected 15 of 15 Senators and 34 of 60 for House.

Portland.—Recounting returns from the different legislative districts representative districts throughout the state indicate that the 27th biennial session of the Oregon legislature will be over whelmingly republican. The republican have apparently elected 15 of the 15 state senators and 34 of the 60 representatives. With two democratic holdover senators out of 15 the democratic will have four seats and the republican 21 at the next session of the state senate and out of a total membership of 60 there will be 16 democratic and 44 republican.

The measures carried at Tuesday's election were: Woman's suffrage, amendment (1903-1907) permitting the classification, repeal of county tax option, amendment doubling liability of bank stockholders state-wide public utilities act, eight-hour law affecting public works, act permitting employment of convicts on roads, act permitting employment of city and county prisoners on roads, limitation on state road bond indebtedness, limitation on county road bond indebtedness, tax exemption on household effects, railroad rate bill.

The measures defeated were: Majority rule on amendments, majority rule on bills, Cascade county, grange road bonding act, state printer bill, hotel inspector, harmony state bonding act for roads, tax exemption on money and credits, inheritance tax law, southern Oregon road act, abolition of state senate, single tax, capital punishment abolition measure, two university referendums.

The figures now available on the state at large, including Multnomah, give the following totals:

For president—Wilson, 40,058; Roosevelt, 31,968; Taft, 25,523.

For United States senator—Lane, 24,188; Selling, 22,943; Bourne, 20,529; Clark, 19,191; Paget, 4,168.

In the first congressional district W. C. Hawley is elected by a plurality of more than 10,000. Hinnott is also far ahead of his opponent but the count is too incomplete to base an estimate upon. Secretary of State Scott in the incomplete returns has a plurality of 30,000. Judge Lakin has been re-elected to the supreme bench. In the contest for railroad commissioner in the second district, C. W. Atkinson has a lead of nearly 4,000 over his nearest competitor. Allick is elected dairy and food commissioner.

October Lumber Shipments Large

Astoria.—During the month of October, 33 vessels loaded at the mills in the lower Columbia river district and their combined cargoes amounted to 30,470,436 feet of lumber. Eight vessels carrying 10,496,712 feet of lumber went to foreign ports, while 25 vessels with cargoes aggregating 20,073,724 feet of lumber sailed for domestic ports, principally in California.

Local Officers Named at U. S. C.

Corvallis.—To fill vacancies in the commanding staff of the Oregon Agricultural College cadet regiment, Commandant W. C. Miller has issued a general order announcing a number of new appointments and promotions which were approved by the college administration.

Ten Horses Burn in Roseburg Fire

Roseburg.—The whole north end of Roseburg was endangered by fire when the Banks & Walker livery stable caught fire and burned to the ground during a 20-mile gale. The loss will be \$20,000. Ten head of horses perished.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

Near Middle-Roads, mother of a Secretary of State (Kinnell) died at Eugene, aged 77 years.

Starting Wednesday for the 12th annual convention of the Oregon State Bar Association at Portland.

It is probable the women of Salem will have their opportunity to vote in Oregon at the city election, coming December 2.

The body of Captain Jacobson, one of the victims of the "Greys," was found on the coast near Marshfield, and taken to San Francisco for burial.

William Campbell, 35 years old, was run over and killed near Tillamook by a train on the Pacific Railroad & Navigation company's line. Left legs were cut off.

Laker voted down an attempt to return to the constitutional government by a 2 to 1 vote, and applied the commission form, which has been in vogue there for the past two years.

Ten thousands of small maple envelopes containing samples of wheat and oats grown in Oregon will be distributed at a station at the Minneapolis Land Show, November 15-25.

The annual meeting of the Oregon State Teachers' association, western division, will be held in Portland, at the Lincoln High school, on the three days following Christmas, December 21, 22 and 23.

According to the report of Portland's municipal tree employment bureau, a total of 2438 persons were furnished with employment during the month of October. Of this number 216 were women.

President Kerr and Dean Cordier of the school of agriculture, left Corvallis Wednesday for Atlanta, Ga., to attend the annual convention of the American Association of Agricultural Colleges and Experiment Stations.

As a result of the election Oregon will have two county judges who are brothers. J. E. McLaughlin, of Albany, was elected judge of Linn county and his brother George McLaughlin, of Vale, was elected judge of Malheur county. L. Alva Lewis and Stanley G. Jewett, of the United States Biological Survey, are in Klamath Falls for the purpose of mapping the boundaries of the first preserve on the Lower Klamath lake and of that at Clear Lake in California.

W. E. Newell, of Gaston, was appointed by Governor West as a member of the board of regents of the University of Oregon to succeed J. E. Alnoworth, whose resignation was tendered some time ago, and which has just been accepted.

Chaining that the recent local option elections held at Rutherlin and Glendale, Douglas county, were not conducted in accordance with the state election laws, District Attorney Brewer was asked to intercede and set aside the verdict of the voters.

Papers have been signed whereby the Pull City Milling company contracted to put in a sawmill at Independence that will cut not less than 100,000 feet of lumber in a day of 24 hours. It is understood the company will open up the Silver timber belt.

The Northwest Smelting & Refining company filed a complaint with the state railroad commission against the Rumpier Valley and O. W. R. & N. railroads, stating that no joint routes or rates exist between those roads, and demanding that such be established.

The Hawley Pulp & Paper company of Oregon City has planned extensive improvements of its plant, which will give it the greatest capacity of any plant on the coast for the manufacture of fruit, tissue and wrapping paper, and will result in the employment of about 150 additional men.

Election returns indicate that four of the six harmony road bills submitted at the recent election by the harmony committee appointed by Governor West may carry, and also one of the grange bills, leaving two harmony bills, one grange bill and the bill submitted by good roads advocates of Jackson county defeated.

For the purpose of securing funds to cooperate with the government in dredging a 20 foot channel over the Coos Bay bar and deepening the present 28 foot inside channel to 25 feet, the commissioners of the port are advertising the sale of 1 per cent gold bonds of the Port of Coos Bay, which aggregate \$200,000 in principal.

With the failure to abolish capital punishment in Oregon there are five men in hang at the state penitentiary on Friday, December 14, who have been sentenced by the governor until that date. They are Mike Morgan, Frank Garrison, Noble Paulsen, John W. Taylor and Jack Roberts. In addition to these John and George Blum-piers are at the prison pending an appeal.

In carrying out its scheme for the electrification of the Willamette valley and the establishment of a suburban service of the utmost importance to Portland business interests, the Portland, Eugene & Eastern railway company purchased from the Portland Railway, Light & Power company the nine mile stretch of railway track known as the Willamette Falls railway, and in part will utilize the old road as a portion of the new route from Portland to Salem.

Milady's Mirror

The face complexion.

"What a splendid color you have!" said one of the girls who met at a fashionable social function after and having seen each other for a month or so. "Have you been away on your vacation?"

"Oh, no," the other replied. "I've been at home—right along."

"It certainly agrees with you. You're not roused?" the other asked tentatively.

The second girl laughed. "None whatever," she replied, raising her cheek with her handkerchief, under which the blood came pouring to the spot in a charming color. "It's all the new way I wash my face. I wash my face in ice."

"Ice? Not more ice water?" the anxious one said.

"No, I mean ice, and I'll tell you how I do it. The reason so many of us have no color in our faces is because our circulation is bad in spite of what the critics say of us. Women seldom do anything to bring the blood to their cheeks. I studied out the following plan: Every morning after I have had my morning exercise to wake me up, I take a small piece of ice and wash my face with it. I go over every spot of my face and neck with it until the piece is entirely gone. As I begin with a piece about half the size of my face, you can see I get a nice cooling. When the ice is melted I run my face briskly with a Turkish towel until it is quite dry.

"My dear, you feel fine. It is evidently cooling in the first place, and it makes you feel very lively. For a minute or two you are red like a frost bitten apple, then that fades away into the nicest color. You see the ice not only helps the circulation, but it acts like a tonic on the muscles and takes away that distressing swelling of the face that so many of us have."

"Well," said the other girl, "I've been paying \$2 a bottle for a face tonic, so it is called, and it hasn't done for me what your humble piece of ice has for you. After this I'm going to look for my complexion in the refrigerator."

To Whiten the Teeth.

To whiten the teeth in excellent powder is made by mixing one ounce of charcoal of fine, ten ounces of prepared chalk, a half ounce of Borax and one ounce of bicarbonate of soda. This should be used once a day until the teeth are sufficiently white, when it is best to discontinue it for an ordinary tooth paste.

To remove tartar, the disfiguring and distasteful yellow discoloration which forms at the base of the teeth, try dipping the brush in powdered magnesia and rubbing it up and down over the teeth as well as across. Dental floss should be drawn between the teeth at least twice a week to keep them free from food obstructions, such as bits of meat gristle or the seeds of berries.

One of the most satisfactory and beneficial mouth washes is peroxide of hydrogen. Many object to its use because of the peculiar sensation known as "burning action," present only when peroxide is particularly active. To counteract this effect neutralize the wash with another made by dissolving common baking soda in water. Peroxide of hydrogen is both a deodorant and an antiseptic and is one of the indispensable remedies to be included in every medicine chest.

Sleep and Beauty.

Sleep is the generator of energy. It is the cooling station of time, where we store enough fuel to take us through the hours to come. When the supply of fuel runs low we are compelled to trudge along at half speed. Our limbs feel as if they were chained to prevent free action, our mind is sluggish, slow to grasp a situation and slower to respond. Lethargy is the foe of beauty of the radiant type. The real beauty sleep comes before midnight and ends when the day is young. This is as nature intended. If work prevents following the natural hours for rest things should be so arranged that sleep will be undisturbed by the noise and activity of the day. If eight hours' sleep are impossible make up for the lost rest by sleeping ten hours the next night. Insomnia is often the result of irregularity of sleeping hours.

Do not neglect to have plenty of fresh air in the room devoted to rest and sleep.

Skin Beauty.

For the yellowish skin nothing is so satisfactory as fruit juices, and the woman who pins her faith to this delightful remedy will surely reap the reward of her trust in nature.

Fruit juices are beneficial principally in that they stimulate the sluggish liver to renewed activity, thus throwing off the poisons which accumulate, and are distributed along the surface of the skin.

Orange juice poured into a cup of hot water and taken before breakfast each morning brings almost immediate results. Grapefruit has much the same effect, but should be taken more sparingly. The juice of half a fruit to one-fourth of a cup of hot water being the correct proportion.
