### Ordinance No. 357.

An ordinance prohibiting minors under the age of 15 years being upon the streets, alleys or other public places in the City of Cottage Grove at certain hours at night, unaccompanied by parent or guardian; providing a penalty for parents or guardians for allowing children upon the streets and public places at such hours and declaring an emergency.

The Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove does ordain:

Section 1. That hereafter it shall be unlawful for any minor boy or girl under the age of 15 years to be upon the streets alleys or other public places within the City of Cottage Grove between the hours of 9 o'clock p. m. and 5 o'clock a. m. from the 1st of October till the 1st of June and between the hours of 10 o'clock p. m. and 5 o'clock a. m. from the 1st of June to the 1st of October, unless such minor child is accompanied by his or her parent, parents or legal guardian or with some person over the age of 21 years by and with the consent of such parent or guardian.

Section 2. Any parent or legal guardian of such minor child or children mentioned in Sec. 1 of this Ordinance suffering or permitting any such child or ward of such parent or guardian to so appear upon the streets, alleys or other public places within the corporate limits of said City contrary to the provisions of Sec. 1 of the Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before the City Recorder of said City shall be fined in a sum not exceeding \$10 and in default of payment of such fine shall be confined in the city jail one day for each \$2 of such fine.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the City Marshal or other peace officer on duty at such hours to ring the fire bell of said City 10 strokes during the summer months above named at the hour of 10 o'clock p. m. each day and 9 strokes during the winter months above named at the hour of 9 o'clock p. m. each day and any minor child mentioned in Sec. 1 of this Ordinance if upon the streets, alleys or other public place shall proceed immediately to his or her home.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the City Marshal or other peace officer on duty when he finds any minor child mentioned in Sec. 1 of this ordinance unaccompanied as provided in Section 1 of this Ordinance to see that said child proceeds immediately to his or her home and to swear to a complaint before the City Recorder charging the father, or if the child has no father residing within the City, the mother, and if the child has neither father or mother residing within the City then the guardian or other person having the care and custody of such child, charging the said father, mother or guardian with a violation of Section 2 of this ordinance.

## EASTERNERS AT O. A. C.

Many Fruit Men Coming to Attend Courses in Horticulture at Oregon College.

"It looks like a big short course attendance in horticulture," said Prof. C. I. Lewis, head of the division of horticulture at the Oregon Agricultural College today discussing the heaviest short course mail ever received here. "There were 155 in attendance last year, 75 the year before, and we are planning how to handle a registration much increased over any previous year."

"Our correspondence from outside the state is greater than ever. A leading New York apple grower will send his son, and we have letters from many other states in the east. One of last year's students has gone into commercial orcharding in Massachusetts, and another is superintending one of the largest peach orchards in the United States, in the east."

"Prof. V. R. Gardner, Prof. A. G. Boquet and I will take with us to the Land Show at Portland some 30 of the regular horticulture students. I would not allow them this trip if I did not feel that they would receive more from it than from the class and laboratory work of the same period. Portland will be used as a nucleus for various horticultural trips, to the market garden regions, early morning trips to the truck markets, trips to the orchards, canneries, by-products manufactories, and the like. The students will gain much from the opportunity to study the exhibits at the show. We will pick out 100 plates of apples to be used in the fruit judging and identification contests. Then, when I am judging fruit, and Prof. Boquet is judging vegetables, the boys will be with us and will have new opportunity to learn points on judging."

Prof. Lewis leaves tomorrow for the National Apple Show at Spokane, where he is to speak on "The Preparation of Land and the Planting of Orchards." He will spend three days there, returning Wednesday. Dean A. B. Cordley was to have led the discussion on "Lime-Sulphur Sprays," but was unable because of his trip to Atlanta, Ga., to the American Association of Agricultural Colleges and Experiment Stations.

Prof. Lewis is to speak at the Portland show on "Loganberries," and at the Albany Apple Show Nov. 13-14 on "Pear Culture in the Willamette Valley." Prof. Gardner will speak at Portland on "Nut Culture in the Pacific Northwest," and Prof. Gardner on "Vegetable Growing" at Albany, where he will judge the vegetable exhibits.

Under the direction of Mrs. Alice Marks Dolman the class prepared the following menu, which was served in the model diningroom with decorations of yellow chrysanthemums grown in the college greenhouses: Creamed oysters in croustades, roast pork with gravy, browned potatoes, buttered peas and imperial apples; hot rolls, peach jam, coffee and pickle relish; nut and celery salad on lettuce with mayonnaise and wafers; lemon sherbet and margarites.

The young women who served the meal were the Misses Emma Ueland, Roseburg; Lila Dobell, Helen Cowgill and Hazel Holt, Corvallis, assisted ably by the rest of the class.

The guests were F. H. Newell, director of the U. S. Reclamation Service, Washington, D. C.; his secretary, Mr. Brown; E. G. Hopson, supervising engineer of the service, Portland; H. D. Newell, in charge of reclamation work on the Umatilla project at Hermiston; J. Griffin, on the same work; W. W. Patch, in charge of the reclamation work in Klamath county; F. Hayden, on the same work; Dr. James Withycombe, director of O. A. C. experiment station; Dean G. A. Covell, engineering; C. I. Lewis, head of the division of horticulture; H. D. Seudder, head of the agronomy department; W. L. Powers, professor of civil engineering; R. W. Allen, superintendent of the Umatilla experiment station; and W. A. Jensen, secretary to the president. State Engineer John H. Lewis was in conference with them, but unable to be present at the dinner.

## EUGENE MURDER MYSTERY DOES NOT DOWN

Walla Walla Negro Under Suspicion; Past Life To Be Probed by Authorities.

Walla Walla, Wash., Nov. 13.—That authorities at Eugene, Ore., think W. M. Bryson, the negro man of mystery, who left last night for Seattle after occupying the spotlight for two days, may know "something of the murder of Mildred Green at Eugene August 20, was evidenced by a telegram received today.

The message from the sheriff at Eugene asked that his connection with the case be investigated. Bryson left last night and the message was forwarded to the officers at Seattle. Bryson came here in August from Seattle, according to the family of E. H. Allen, white, at whose home the black man stayed for three months without neighbors knowing it. Allen will not give the exact date, except that it was about three months ago. The Allens are much exercised that Bryson has been made to leave town. They say that the people of Walla Walla will have to answer to Bryson, and the Lord for what they have done. Allen said that theirs was the house of God, the only one in the world.

Mrs. Allen says that Bryson had no influence over them, but that she is a medium. She avers that through the connection with the spiritual world she got a straight tip on the results of a prizefight before that came off and that her husband won a good-sized sum on betting on the pre-ordained winner.
