Bacon and Dumplings in Camp.

A recipe for delicious dumplings and bacon for camping parties is given in the book on "Camp Cookery" published by the domestic science department of the Oregon Agricultural College. The book has proven so popular that the first edition has been exhausted, and at present no funds are available for a reprint so excerpts will be published in the papers from time to time.

For bacon and dumplings in camp, put enough sliced bacon for the party into a hot frying pan and fry until crisp and brown, and remove. Pour in boiling water till the pan is half full. Make a stiff batter of 2 cups of flour, 4 teaspoons of baking powder, 1 tablespoon of grease and enough water to make it the right thickness. Drop the batter into the bacon gravy by spoonfuls, cover, and cook until well done. Thicken the gravy after the dumplings are removed with a little flour and water batter, and serve with the crisp bacon.

Bacon fritters can be made by slicing the bacon (or pork) and, after soaking it in water for an hour, rolling it in corn meal or flour and frying it in bacon grease.
