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PEACE OF EUROPE HANGS BY THREAD

Powers Deny Preparations For War, But Situation Regarded as Ominous.

London.—The extreme anxiety manifested by all European governments to deny reports of warlike preparations and to represent the political situation as peaceful and satisfactory is in itself an indication on how slender a thread the issues of peace and war in Europe now hang.

The danger arises not alone from the conflicting interests of Austria, Servia and the other powers, but from the possibility that Turkey, following the traditional policy of profiting by the embroilment of the great powers, may adopt an irreconcilable attitude in the peace negotiations.

In the diplomatic field the most important reports are that Serbia declined to reply to the Austrian demands until the war is concluded and that Germany has not undertaken to mediate between Austria and Russia. Fighting continues around Adrianople, where the besieging forces are reported to have drawn their investing circle to within two-thirds of a mile of the town.

The losses to Turks and Bulgarians have been enormous, but the demoralization of the main Turkish army has not extended to the garrison at Adrianople, which daily displays desperate gallantry. It has succeeded several times in winning back lost ground, especially on the right bank of the Maritza river where the seventh division, under the Bulgarian general Khirkhoff, has retired four miles, and on the left bank, where a Serbian division has sustained heavy losses.

Vienna.—A rumor has spread that the Austrian Consul at Urisend, Prochaska, had been killed by Servian troops. There is no confirmation to this. The military journal says the Austrian squadron in Turkish waters has been ordered home.

SUFFRAGISTS DECIDE TO ENTER POLITICS

Philadelphia.—The National Woman Suffrage Association, by an overwhelming vote, 380½ to 38½, sanctioned participation by its officers and members in the affairs of political parties.

Miss Jane Addams, of Chicago, precipitated the issue. When she allied herself with a political party in June she started an opposition within the suffrage organization. She frankly told the convention that she had forgotten she was a member of the suffrage association when she committed herself to the political movement. Miss Addams' political activity caused Mrs. George Howard Lewis, of Buffalo, N. Y., to prepare an amendment to the constitution directing that all officers and members of the association shall maintain a strictly non-partisan attitude toward all political parties unless they come from states where equal suffrage is in force.

The association elected its officers for the ensuing year as follows:

President, Anna Howard Shaw, of Pennsylvania; first vice-president, Jane Addams, of Chicago; second vice-president, Charlotte Anita Whitney, of California; corresponding secretary, Mary Ware Dennett of New York; recording secretary, Susan W. Fitzgerald, of Boston; treasurer, Katherine Dexter McCormick, of Boston, formerly of Chicago; first auditor, Harriet Burton Laddlaw, of New York; second auditor, Mrs. Joseph T. Bowen, of Chicago.
