Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

Medford Women Would Have Delegate

Medford.—A strenuous effort will be made to have the second woman delegate from Oregon to the inauguration of Woodrow Wilson named from Medford. The women of the Greater Medford club believe they are entitled to recognition as their efforts in Jackson county secured the largest proportional majority for the measure given at the recent election. Jackson county went for amendment No. 1 by over 1000 votes.

Bend Woman is First Juror.

Bend.—At a trial here the first woman ever to serve upon a central Oregon jury participated, and was not only a juror, but also was chosen foreman of the jury by her five male co-jurors. Mrs. Hattie Corbett was the "forewoman." That she happens to be an ardent suffragette, and worked for the suffrage amendment during the recent election, adds further to the interest of her unique position.

164 LABORERS ARE KILLED

5179 Accidents Reported in State in 16 Months.

Salem.—State Labor Commissioner Hoff has completed the record of accidents in Oregon for the months from May 20, 1911, to September 30, 1912, inclusive, to be used in connection with his biennial report.

Out of a total of 5179 accidents reported, 164 proved fatal. Sawmills and planing mills led the list with 645 accidents, of which 16 were fatal. Machine shops and foundries were second with 544 accidents, of which two were fatal. Logging proved the most hazardous as far as fatalities are concerned, leading the list of fatalities with 44 out of a total of 461 accidents in that branch of employment.

The law requires reports of all accidents occurring where more than three are employed, and that results in loss of time by the injured and the services of a physician.

While the accidents reported are fairly complete as to the industries and operations of large and medium proportions, it is said by Mr. Hoff that the law is unheeded in a good many cases where few are employed and the work is of a more transient character.

Retailers Will Convene at Albany.

Albany.—The Oregon Retail Merchants Association will meet in Albany in annual convention Wednesday and Thursday, January 22 and 23, 1913. The dates for the convention were selected at a meeting in this city, which was attended by the officers of the state association and at which the Albany Retail Merchants' association was organized.

Weather Station at Hood River.

Hood River.—An observation station of the United States weather bureau will be established in the Hood River valley, a frost chart will be made of the district and the fruit-growers here will co-operate with the Portland office in working to predict frosts and ward off injuries that may come to the orchards.

GRAND JUNKET IS PLANNED

Baker, Union and Umatilla County Folk Coming Over Divide.

Pendleton.—Baker, Union and Umatilla counties will gather at Pendleton about January 15 to start on the largest junketing trip ever launched by eastern Oregon citizens, according to plans laid at a meeting at the commercial club here, when representatives from the adjoining counties were present to lend their aid. Each county will carry a junket car and numerous Pullmans will be picked up at various points along the route. The boosters will stop at all important towns and cities of the Willamette valley, going as far south as Klamath Falls, though the big windup will be at Albany on the dates set for the gathering of the Retail Merchants' Association, January 22 and 23.

About 10 days will be passed in making the entire trip, and much enthusiasm was manifested by those present at the meeting here. This will be the first eastern Oregon delegation of its kind to invade the western part of the state. The commercial clubs of the various towns in this section are strongly supporting the movement.

Fir Root Louse Menaces Timber

Corvallis.—A new menace to the timber trade is found in the fir root louse, recently discovered by the entomology experts of the Oregon agricultural college. It is called *procliphilus bumellae*, and often prevents young trees from growing.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

A summary of the assessment of Harney county for 1912 shows property in that county valued at \$7,342,285. Ora Knight, a Pendleton man, aged 25, committed suicide by shooting himself with a revolver through the left side.

From some unknown cause fire broke out in the new auditorium wing of the state penitentiary, damaging that institution to the extent of \$2000.

The state Bee-keepers association of Oregon is preparing a bill to present to the legislature, providing for the appointment of a state bee inspector.

Election accounts filed with the secretary of the senate show that Senator Bourne spent \$770, Ben Selling \$1119, Harry Lane \$1079, and B. Lee Paget \$268.

Announcement was made by State Superintendent of Public Instruction Alderman that the Country Life Commission will meet in conference at Salem January 3 and 4.

State School Superintendent Alderman, who received a broken ankle about two months ago, while traveling in Lake county on a motorcycle, is again able to be at his office.

Governor West, as trustee for the state of Oregon, has made a filing on the waters of Tanner creek, in order to protect them for the use of the state fish hatchery on that creek.

Based on reports from the horticultural commissioners and the county fruit inspectors in the different counties, the Oregon apple crop this year represents a value of a little over \$7,000,000.

More than 200 boys from 50 cities and towns of Oregon attended the fifth annual boys' conference, which was held at Eugene for three days under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. of Oregon and Idaho.

Asserting that they have been receiving a great deal of unjust criticism regarding "blind pig" conditions in Albany, Chief of Police Ellis Dougherty and his entire force of five men have handed in their resignations.

Figures compiled by the secretary of state show that promoters and opponents of the various measures which were before the people at the recent general election in Oregon expended \$112,533.15, or practically \$1 a vote.

The Astoria chamber of commerce is fathering a movement to ask the federal government to turn over to the fisheries department of Oregon all the moneys it receives for the rental of sites on Sand Island that are used as seining grounds.

Captain James Blakely, an Oregon pioneer, on Tuesday began his second century of life at Brownsville, a city which he founded more than 60 years ago. The entire population of the city joined with his 85 descendants in doing honor to the aged pioneer.

Senator Chamberlain has been advised by the forest service that Oregon's 10 per cent of forest reserve receipts out of the last appropriation amounts to \$17,023, all of which has been allotted except \$946, which is being held as an emergency fund to be applied later as necessity arises.

M. G. Settle, who shot and killed Bert Crowley last summer near Susanville, stopped his trial at Canyon City by pleading guilty to murder in the second degree. Settle and Crowley were warm friends but engaged in a quarrel while intoxicated, after which Settle waylaid and shot his friend.

Creation of an insurance fund for protection of state institutions and buildings so that the burden of loss of a big fire would not fall upon the taxpayers of the state at one time, is the plan suggested by Governor West in response to a statement by the attorney general that he believes the state should not carry its own insurance.

Unusual interest in the work of Farmers' Week, December 9-14, and the winter short courses, January 6 to February 7, has been reported by the 14 members of the Oregon Agricultural College faculty who were in charge of the extension exhibit which the institution had on display at the Pacific Northwest Land Products Show in Portland.

Final arrangements are being made for the holding of the thirteenth annual convention of the Young Men's Christian association of Oregon and Idaho at Forest Grove on January 10, 11 and 12, when one of the biggest events in the Y. M. C. A. year will take place. Every local association in the two states will be represented, and every church is entitled to send a representation.
