PROHIS TO BANQUET

Jubilant Over Past Campaign, Preparing for Fray of Next Campaign.

To the Editor: Now that the smoke of the last campaign has cleared away and the returns are practically all in, the Prohibitionists of Oregon are "doing a little shouting" all by themselves over the large increase in the "Prohi" vote in the state. The counties that were organized and worked thoroughly both by field workers and local people, made the finest kind of showing. The local candidates in all cases were well supported and in most districts the national ticket received nearly double the Chafin vote of 1908.

Some of the local candidates ran far ahead of their tickets and only failed of election by a few votes. In Linn county, Elmore, candidate for the legislature, lost by 42 votes, and in Lane county Bryson, candidate for sheriff, lost to the democratic man by 13 votes. In Clackamas county, four constables and three justices of the peace were elected on the Prohibition ticket while in Union county a county surveyor was put into office.

The legislative candidates made a very fine showing in every county where a ticket was put in the field. In Linn county the vote was 1819 for the legislative man. In Lane county the highest vote was 3073, lacking 13 votes of as many as the winning candidate.

The Chafin-Watkins vote, over the state was nearly double the vote cast in 1908, the figures are 2627 in 1908 against 4677 this campaign.

The old objections to the Prohibition party are being broken down. The oft repeated statement that the party is a "preacher's party" has, in Oregon at least, been proven otherwise. In fact, Oregon leads the states in the fine type of business men that are declaring their allegiance to a party that stands four-square on all the issues of present day interest.

With this record it is not strange that the State Committee is as busy as it can be mapping out the plans for the next two years and putting the men into the field to do the preliminary work for the biggest campaign that Oregon has ever seen.

This week the call has been sent throughout the state for a "get-together" meeting of the Prohibition workers. This is in the nature of a conference and the plans for future action will be adopted. The date will be December 10th and 11th, and a banquet will be held the evening of the 10th. Speakers of state wide reputation will be present and a number of out-of-town guests. We are extending a special invitation to the women citizens, and they will be represented on the banquet program and at the conference.

The biggest thing that is before the State Committee is the raising of the campaign fund for the next two years. It has been decided to raise \$100,000 and already the people are responding to the call for volunteers in this financial work and on every hand we are being assured that it can be done, that raising \$100,000 will be no harder this campaign than it was to raise \$25,000 in the year that is just past.

The Prohibition bugle has given the call to "forward march." The Prohibition army knows no retreat and we are pressing on to victory.

Order to Show Cause.

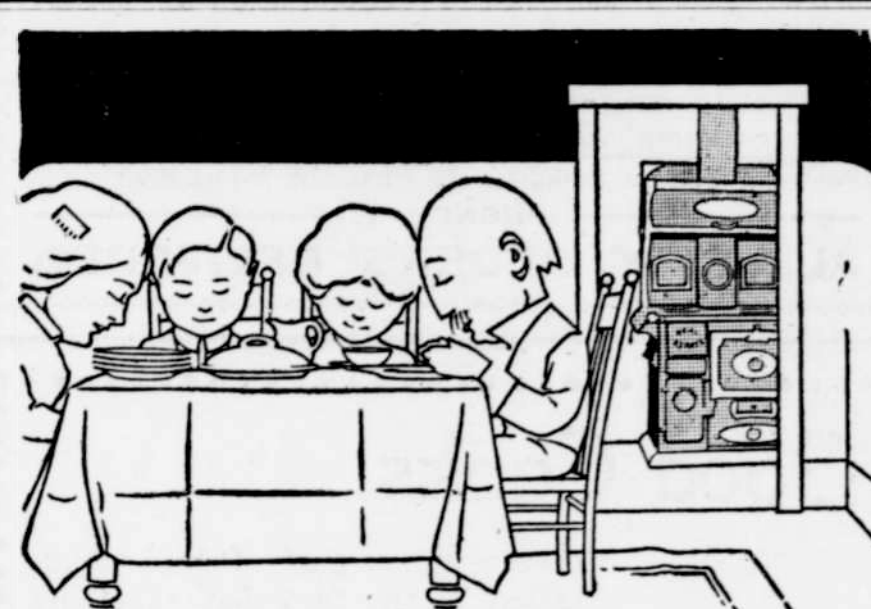
IN THE COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON FOR LANE COUNTY.
