Will Build Brick Factory.

The little town of Elmira promises to become a center for the manufacture of brick in the near future. A stock company will soon be organized to erect a plant there and when the new railway now under construction through the town is placed in operation the plant will be started up.

The company which is being organized owns three acres of land there. The land is on the McCutcheon place. Mr. McCutcheon and Mr. Hunter, of Elmira, J. W. Wagers and E. Petlier of Eugene, are the incorporators. Mr. Petlier, who has had 40 years' experience in the manufacture of brick in the east, said: The clay from the land is excellent for brick, tiling and sewer pipe. The clay is in several colors and is declared suitable for the manufacture of the best of the cream and mottled pressed brick.

State Superintendent L. R. Alderman, who received a broken ankle about two months ago, while traveling in Lake county on a motorcycle, is again able to be at his office. He attempted to get out a few weeks ago, but because the fracture was not healing properly, the doctor ordered him back to his home. It is thought he will have to use crutches for many months more.

Oregon cheese took honors at the recent National Dairy Show at Chicago, winning second honors in a competition with 800 samples of the cheese maker's art from all parts of the country. This, too, in spite of the fact that the long shipment to Chicago took off three points in the score given this state's products, which was 954 out of a possible 100.

Forest reserves in Oregon will contribute a total of \$42,259 to the state in 1912. Most of this money goes to state road work and it is derived from the sale of timber within the forest reserves, a certain percentage of which goes to the state in which the reserves are located.
