PROGRESSIVES HOLD CHICAGO CONFERENCE

Party Leaders Assemble to Plan on Work During Next Four Years.

Chicago.—The event of the week in the field of politics was the national conference of progressive leaders in Chicago Tuesday and Wednesday, to devise plans for carrying on the work of the party during the next four years. Colonel Roosevelt was among those in attendance at the conference. He has entirely recovered from his wound and took active part.

"Without trafficking or dicker with the old parties, fight to have our platform principles embodied in the laws of Illinois," was the appeal Colonel Roosevelt made to the newly-elected members of the Illinois legislature, to whom he made his first speech at the conference.

Among those who participated in the deliberations were: Governor Stubbs of Kansas, William Allen White, Henry J. Allen, Editor Van Valkenburg of Philadelphia, Gifford Pinchot, William Flinn, Bull Moose leader in Pennsylvania; Dean Kitchney of Columbia university; State Chairman Hotchkiss of New York, former Attorney General Charles B. Bonaparte, Miss Frances Keller of New York, Miss Alice Carpenter of Massachusetts and many other persons of prominence. Colonel Roosevelt and Mr. and Mrs. McCormick will be the guests at Hull House of Jane Addams.

The largest single delegation came from New York on a special train with Colonel Roosevelt. The Colonel was greeted at the railroad station with cheers and shouts of "he can come back."

The committee on arrangements in attendance at the conference included every state chairman and members of the national executive committee, as well as hundreds of members of the party, including many women.

OUTLAW ROBS TRAIN

"Imperial Limited" Pullman Is Looted Near Vancouver, B. C.

Vancouver, B. C.—A train holdup that for boldness has never been equaled in Vancouver was perpetrated just as the Canadian Pacific railway's "Imperial Limited" transcontinental passenger train, was passing out of the Vancouver city limits.

A single highwayman, disguised by a black mask, boarded the train as it was passing the British Columbia Sugar Refinery, a mile and a half out, entered the Pullman car and at the point of a revolver forced the passengers and the Pullman conductor to pass over their money and valuables. The man dropped off the train just before it arrived at Barnet, which is six miles from the city.

The total loss was \$308 in bills, two watches and one chain, one diamond ring and two English sovereigns, amounting to about \$10. The conductor contributed \$30 of the \$308. There is no trace of the robber.

No Peace Prize Awarded

Christiania.—The Nobel Peace prize will not be awarded this year. This is the first time since the establishment of the Nobel foundation that the committee or Norwegian parliament has found no person worthy of the award. The committee states that it has decided that there has been "no work deserving of the prize."

BRITAIN PROTESTS AT PANAMA TOLLS

Washington.—Great Britain's formal note of protest against that section of the Panama Canal act which exempts American coastwise shipping from payment of tolls for passing through the Panama canal, a document written by Sir Edward Grey, British Minister of Foreign Affairs, was presented to Secretary Knox by the British ambassador, James Bryce, who read the note word for word to the secretary in the latter's home. It is an elaboration of the points of objection in the note presented to the state department last July.

In brief these are the objections: "That while it was clearly in violation of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty either to remit or refund tolls on all American shipping using the canal, the same objection probably would apply to the coastwise shipping in view of the probable impossibility of framing regulations that would not result in a reference to American shipping."

In addition to supporting these points by long arguments, Sir Edward indicates clearly that strong resistance will be offered to any attempt to exclude from the canal British ships owned by Canadian railroads or whose owners may be guilty of violating the Sherman anti-trust act. He holds that this section of the act cannot apply to British shipping, but only to United States vessels.

ROBBERS' HAUL IS \$20,000

Two Men Hold up Express Car and Get Bank's Money

Bakersfield, Cal.—Twenty thousand dollars in gold was the haul of two robbers who held up the express car of the Sunset Western train bound from Bakersfield for Taft, Cal. The money was consigned to the First National Bank of Taft by the First National Bank of Bakersfield. It was not placed in the express safe.

When the train arrived at Taft railroad men were forced to break down the door of the express car. In a corner covered with mail sacks was M. W. Hamby, the express messenger, who was just regaining consciousness, but physicians who examined him declared that apparently he was not seriously hurt. Hamby could provide only few details of the robbery.

Several possses left here for the scene of the robbery, and others are searching in the vicinity of Maricopa and Taft.

Governors Repudiate Blease's Views

Richmond, Va.—The governors' conference unanimously repudiated the recent utterance of Governor Blease, of South Carolina, concerning the lynching of negroes. By a vote of 14 to 4 it adopted a resolution declaring against mob violence and for the impartial enforcement of the law.

Hadley Plan Opposed by Borah

Washington.—Senator Borah of Idaho, is not in favor of the proposal of Governor Hadley, of Missouri, to call a convention of republicans next summer for the purpose of perfecting plans for the reorganization of the republican party. He does not think such a convention would be practicable or successful, as it would have no recognized authority, and would not bind anyone by its action.

BALKAN WAR PEACE PROSPECTS IMPROVE

London.—The prospects of a satisfactory and reasonably rapid settlement of the Balkan war and of the greater European interests hanging upon it seem brighter than at any time since the allied armies took the field against Turkey. The envoys from the Balkan kingdoms and the Ottoman empire, will hold the first meeting of the peace conference next Friday, Dec. 13th.

At the same time the ambassadors of the great powers in London charged with the task of protecting the interests of their countries will meet as a sort of court of appeals to watch, advise and admonish the peace delegates.

This will be by far the most important assembly of diplomats since the Berlin conference of the Russo-Turkish war. Giants like Bismarck, Beaconsfield, Salisbury and Gortchakoff, to be sure, will not tread the stage, but their successors who go will have an equally important work to perform.
