Lane Girl Supervisor Covers Field on Horse

Visiting Rural Schools Hard Job in Wild Western Country :: ::

One of the most conspicuous figures at the state teachers' association meeting was a slender little brown-eyed woman, who rode 60 miles miles by stage and over 100 by rail to get to the meeting, and who, on being introduced to the assembly of rural school supervisors was declared to have done the best work of any supervisor in the state.

The young woman is Miss Goldie Van Bibber, rural supervisor for the western end of Lane county—the Siuslaw valley—the most remote and inaccessible section in the state, where the conditions that exist are comparable only with those in the mountainous regions of Kentucky.

Miss Van Bibber, over in that section, is known as "the school lady on the gray horse." Glad in corduroy, with her brown saddle bags thrown across her gray horse, Dandy, she follows mountain trails, fords, rushing streams, follows along roads that are almost impassable several months of the year with deep mud, all in order that the schools of that section can be coaxed up to the standards that her ideals have set.

Miss Van Bibber has been a rural supervisor for two years—ever since the law went into effect—and what she has accomplished in her district is already a matter of history in the valley and is being talked about all over the state in educational circles, although in her report today she said she had really been only "getting up steam" and had not done anything yet. She is a rural supervisor by choice, having specialized on the problems of the rural schools.

"I wouldn't teach in the city for anything," she declared. "I am country born and bred. My education at the state university was aimed to fit me to carry on this work, which I consider has the biggest future of anything in the educational line in the state."

Miss Van Bibber declares that if the rural school supervisor law is repealed it will mean death to the schools in her section of the country. When she went there many of the schools had never been visited by a superintendent, there were no courses of study used and no prescribed textbook. She found one teacher with 23 pupils holding 45 recitations a day. She has in the two years of her work established the prescribed course and installed uniform text books, six new schools have been built and there is prospect of several more; the teachers' salaries have been raised from an average of \$43 to \$55 a month, and she has eliminated the three months' trial contract, raising it to six months and in town to eight or nine months.

Miss Van Bibber gets all over her territory, a total area of 350 square miles, on horseback, often making 25 or 30 miles a day in bad weather, hampered by falling timber, swollen streams and mud.

"My people," said she, "are of the intelligent class, living on homesteads, timber claims or stock ranches, but because of the heavy rains and the inaccessibility of the roads have been in the past almost shut off from educational advantages for the children. Through cooperation and ready supervision we hope to bring about great changes.—Oregonian.

CRESWELL HOST TO FRUIT MEN

Pruning and Care of Young Orchards Discussed.

Creswell, Ore., Jan. 6.—A very successful all-day meeting of the Lane County Horticultural Society was held here today with prominent horticulturists present from all the fruit sections of the county. The care and pruning of young orchards were explained during the morning session by Mr. Christianson and Mr. Soper and in the discussion that followed Fruit Inspector J. Beebe, Mr. Stewart of Cottage Grove, M. H. Harlow of Eugene, and others, took part. L. P. Harrington, the original booster for Creswell, presided the greater part of the time.

Following dinner at the hotel and a serenade by Creswell band, Edward Webber and Frank Harrington, who are attending the state agricultural college, spoke briefly telling why it is desirable for farmers to keep in touch with the work of the agricultural college. During the afternoon there were discussions on the raising of loganberries, poultry raising in connection with the fruit business and insect pests, this latter subject having been taken by George Taylor president of the association. City School Superintendent Wakefield made a plea for the addition of courses in agriculture to the Creswell schools which now have manual training for the boys.

The next meeting of the association will be held in Portland the first Saturday in February.

WATER SYSTEM IN VALLEY OUTLINED

ENGINEER KELSEY FILES PLAN WITH THE STATE BOARD.

Plant, Furnishing Every Willamette City and State Institution With Pure Water, Cost Probably \$4,000,000.

After an exhaustive investigation, as authorized by the State Board of Health a year ago, Louis C. Kelsey, the engineer appointed for the purpose, laid before the board at its annual meeting at Salem yesterday, his report on the possibilities of supplying the 13 towns and cities of the Upper Willamette valley and the state institutions with an abundant supply of pure water from Clear Lake at an estimated cost of between \$3,900,000 and \$4,800,000, according to specifications.

"The unsatisfactory character of the present water supply," reads the report, "to the Upper Willamette valley communities and to the public institutions is common knowledge to the thousands of water consumers and to others who have become familiar with the existing conditions.

Typhoid Traced to Water. "In the year 1906 and again in 1910 the people of Eugene were afflicted with an epidemic of typhoid fever and in 1909 a similar and equally serious epidemic, also traceable to the water supply, was in Salem, but only temporary remedial measures have been adopted in these two cities looking toward more acceptable conditions of water supply.

"Incidentally, attention has been drawn at this time by the public press to the breaking out of an epidemic of typhoid fever at Oregon City. "Where filtration and chemical agencies have been adopted as a means of minimizing the contaminated character of the water as at Albany, Eugene, Salem and Springfield, the objections as to lack of purity have been overcome temporarily. In these cities, excepting Eugene, as also in most of the others mentioned, the people are without municipal ownership of the water supply and its service and there are still some complaints about the quality of the water and, at times, as to the quantity furnished.

Municipal Ownership Favored. "Regarding municipal ownership, the verdict of the people wherever it has been sought, as at Eugene and Salem, has been nearly always in favor of the city owning and controlling the important public utility of supply and service of water. In several of the towns complaint is common of the inadequacy both of supply and service at times when water is most needed.

"None of the municipalities named in this report has a suitable water supply; not one has water coming by gravity directly from a pure source in the mountains. Several of the state institutions at Salem and the University of Oregon, at Eugene, are supplied with no better quality of water than are the cities in or near which the institutions are located. The water supply to the larger towns taking water from millraces or from wells adjacent to river banks is contaminated to varying degrees of danger to the public health by reason of drainage from habitations or discharge of raw sewage from places above the source."

Cottage Grove, not named in the engineer's report, is the only valley city having a supply of pure mountain water.

Wells Are Dangerous. "In this connection the Board of Health report declares: 'It is safe to say that typhoid fever would be reduced to from 50 to 75 per cent. in small cities and towns if they would abandon the individual well and install a community supply.'

Various plans have been made tentatively in the past and at Salem, following the Legislative session of 1909, the issuance of \$3,900,000 of bonds was authorized to acquire the plant of the Salem Water company, but nothing definite has been done.

Governor Urges Quick Action. Governor West indorses the action heartily, declaring that "the present water system and the well system are both open to objection, while the need for better water for the state institutions is urgent."

He favors cooperation between the state and the city and suggested that the work of pipelaying and construction of headworks could be done by convict labor.

At the present rate and allowing for increase on a conservative basis, the total population to be served in 1920 would be at least 70,000 and in 1940 about 200,000.

The proposed water supply system could be completed by 1918 to serve a population of 200,000.—Oregonian.

Production Statist Should Be From Life

General Statements Smack Too Much of Booster Literature ::

In a recent letter to the Register, O. H. Skotheim pointed out the necessity for collecting statistics of actual production, and urged the taking of steps to gather data that will concern itself chiefly with what has actually been done by farmers who are tilling land in the upper Willamette valley. His suggestion is an excellent one—none the less excellent because it is hard to carry out.

The problem of the Willamette valley—all of Oregon, for that matter—is to get more people on the farms. Before the needed people can be induced to come here and settle on the land, they must be convinced that it is to their interest to come. Naturally, we must advertise. Community advertising, however, has become almost universal practice. Florida is advertising for settlers. So is Missouri; so is Vermont; so is Arizona. The desirable citizen who is thinking of moving to another state is bombarded with beautifully printed and illustrated literature, all of which sets forth the fact that the section from which it comes is the original location of the Garden of Eden.

There is a natural and human tendency to discount the statements of the man who is paid to talk, and to believe those of the one who talks merely because he is interested in his subject. Signed statements from actual producers, telling just what they have done, what crops they have planted, what returns they got from an acre, the price that was received when the product was marketed, and other details drawn from actual experience, will do more to bring settlers to the Willamette valley than half a dozen carloads of handsome books and pamphlets that deal only in general statements.

The Register has long made a practice of gathering these little stories of actual experience, and it believes that if more people realized the splendid advertising value of personal testimonials, more of them would be forthcoming.—Eugene Register.

TO ELECT SUPERVISORS

Asks that County Court in the Meantime Grant People the Right of Choice.

Crow, Ore., Jan. 3.—Resolutions expressing the belief that road supervisors should be elected by the people instead of being appointed by the county court have been adopted by the Crow Grange. The grange goes on record as favoring a law providing for popular choice of supervisors, and requests the county court to grant that right until such a law shall be enacted. The resolutions in full are as follows:

"Inasmuch as there is great dissatisfaction in regard to our present road system and the tendency seems to be to take the power from the people's hands in the matter of selecting road supervisors,

"Therefore, be it resolved by Crow Grange No. 450, that we believe the people are thoroughly competent and are in better position to choose their various road supervisors than the county court can possibly be, and that it is the sense of this grange that we should be allowed that privilege.

"Be it further resolved, that we favor a law granting us that right.

"Be it further resolved, that we ask the court to grant us our choice until such law shall be enacted.

"And further that we ask the assistance of all the granges in the county to aid us in what we deem is only a matter of justice to the taxpayers of this county."
