FAVORED FREE TEXT BOOKS IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS
Supervisory System Upheld by Convention of Lane County School Officers.

By a peculiar coincidence the convention of Lane County teachers held in Eugene January 6 endorsed every stand The Sentinel has recently taken on school problems. Less frequent changes in text books, free text books, the continuance of industrial work and the supervisory system were the things endorsed.

The resolutions as adopted follow: "Be it resolved, that the convention favors legislation that will tend to prevent the frequent change of the text books and... "Resolved, that we approve the revision of the state textbook law, as provided in the recommendation of State Superintendent Alderman in a bill recently prepared and to be presented to the incoming legislature.

"Resolved, that we favor the continuance of the industrial and agricultural work for the boys and girls of the schools of Oregon, as introduced last year by the state superintendent of public instruction and that more time be given to the work.
"Resolved, that it be the sense of the convention that we approve the supervisory law.

Heavy Woman Dies.

In the death of Mrs. McCord, at Halfway, Oregon, this week the northwest lost one of its largest women. Mrs. McCord weighed nearly 400 pounds, but despite her superfluous flesh was active, she having a large garden which she attended and did other work about the farm, where she lived with one of her daughters, Ethel. Mrs. McCord had to do all the heavy work because her husband had been in Idaho for several years. Death was caused by fatty degeneration of the kidneys. It took six men to lift the body into the casket, which had to be made especially for her, and it required 12 pall bearers at the funeral at her home Tuesday, at which Reverend Mosely of the Presbyterian Church presided. Burial was in the Halfway cemetery. The other children were Mrs. George Holbrook and Mrs. J. Motely of Halfway, and a son in Chico, California. All the children are of normal size.
