Amount and kinds.—163,100,000 feet B. M., more or less, of sawtimber, approximately 96.6 per cent live Douglas fir, 0.60 per cent dead Douglas fir, 1.10 per cent western hemlock, 1.40 per cent live western red cedar, 0.15 per cent dead western red cedar and 0.15 per cent live and dead sugar pine.

Location and area.—About 3060 acres, Umpqua National Forest, Oregon, in portions of Secs. 18, 20, 21, 29, 31, 32 and all of Secs. 19 and 30, Twp. 21 S., R. 1 E., W. M., in the Row River watershed.

Stumpage prices.—Lowest rates accepted \$1.25 per M. for live and dead Douglas fir, western red cedar, and sugar pine and \$0.50 per M. for western hemlock. Rates to be readjusted at option of the forester during the second three year period and during the last four year period.

Contract period.—Ten years, with not more than three months for preliminary construction.

Deposit.—With bid \$5,000.00, to apply on purchase price if bid is accepted, or refunded if rejected. Twenty per cent may be retained as forfeit if the contract and bond are not executed within the required time.

Final date for bids.—Sealed bids will be received by the District Forester, Portland, Oregon, up to and including February 6, 1913. The date for receipt of bids will be extended 30 days upon the request of any person who desires additional time for the examination of the timber.

Before bids are submitted full information concerning the character of the timber, conditions of sale, deposits, and the submission of bids should be obtained from the District Forester, Portland, Oregon, or the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon. Consultation with forest officers and inspection of the sale area is urged.

The right to reject any or all bids is reserved.
