SEPARATION IS BEGUN

Eight New Directors Chosen on Southern Pacific.

New York.—The separation of the Southern Pacific board of directors from the Union Pacific board through the election of eight new members not connected with the Union Pacific, announced here, is the first direct step in the dissolution of the Union Pacific system. The resignation of eight directors to make room for new members removed from the board of the Southern Pacific all its members with the exception of those who were formerly members also of the Union Pacific board.

The new members of the board are representative of the protective committee of the Southern Pacific stockholders. It is understood that Attorney-General Wickham indicated in his conference with the Harriman line and protective committee representatives that he preferred to carry on negotiations directly with the directors of the Southern Pacific in dealing with any representatives of the Southern Pacific interests.

Packers Ordered to Improve Chicago.—Charges against Chicago meat-packing firms are made by State Factory Inspector Edgar T. Davies. The packers must make \$1,000,000 worth of improvements on their plants to safeguard the lives of their employees, or face trial on more than one count.

"Big Tim" Committed to Sanitarium New York.—By court order it was learned that Congressman-elect Timothy D. Sullivan, who has long been a prominent figure in New York legislative affairs, is to be formally committed to a private sanitarium in Yonkers. He is suffering from a fatal malady. It is feared it will not be long before the disease completes its course.

PROGRESSIVES PLAN ON 1914 CAMPAIGN

New York.—Complete plans for a continuation of the progressive party for a fight to secure control of county governments and of the next congress, were announced here. Leaders of the party from every section of the country were in session for two days, and it was announced that permanent headquarters had been established; that a publicity bureau would be opened and that the party would have a complete organization within a reasonable period.

"The first objective," says the report of the conference, as made public, "is the organization of the progressive party in every county and congressional district throughout the country with the purpose of having county tickets nominated for the election of 1914 and of making an effective far-reaching congressional campaign in that year. Emphasis is laid upon the purpose of the party to have a candidate in every congressional district in the country in the next congressional election."

NEWS FROM OUR NATIONAL CAPITAL

Financier Says Control of Money in Bad Hands Might Cause Trouble.

Washington.—That the present concentration of money and credit "has gone far enough," that "in bad hands" it would have a bad effect upon the nation, that the safety of the situation lies in the personnel of the men in control and that present conditions are "not entirely comfortable for the country" were a few of the statements by George F. Baker, master of finance, as the climax of an examination before the house money trust committee.

Mr. Baker reviewed in detail the operations of himself, his bank, the First National Bank of New York and J. P. Morgan & Co., in the issuance of bonds.

"In Wall street," said Baker, "Morgan is recognized as the great general of the financial army." He admitted that he and James Stillman were Morgan's chief lieutenants, saying:

"Morgan could be the dominant financial power of the world if he were younger." Concluding his testimony, Baker admitted that the wealth of the nation had been greatly concentrated during recent years.

Democrats Will Hold up Appointments Democratic senators held a caucus and decided to stand pat in their opposition to confirmation of Taft appointees.

The republicans having refused to cooperate with a democratic committee to consider the nominations with a view to determining what should be and what should not be confirmed, they determined to hold up everything but army and navy promotions and the diplomatic appointments.

Postmasters and other civil appointments intended to be filled with republicans within a few weeks of the end of the republican administration will be protested against by the democrats, even if it takes a filibuster to enforce their protests.

Republican senators profess to believe there will be wholesale confirmation before the session is much older, but it now seems that everything depends upon the progressives. If they are present in full numbers and vote solidly with the democrats, they can defeat the Taft appointments.

Appropriation Bill Carries \$40,800,000. The first appropriation bill of the present session of congress was reported to the house by the house rivers and harbors committee Monday and provides \$40,800,000 for the improvement of rivers and harbors throughout the country.

The bill carries the following appropriations for northwestern waterways: Mouth of the Columbia river, \$1,000,000; Columbia and lower Willamette, Portland to the sea, \$160,000; Columbia at Cascades, \$100,000; Celilo canal, \$600,000; Willamette and Yamhill rivers, \$42,000; Columbia and Snake rivers above Celilo, \$40,000; Columbia, Bridgeport to Kettle Falls, \$25,000; Snake river, \$25,000; Yaquina bay, \$28,800; Coos bay, \$80,000; Nehalem bay, \$100,000; Coquille river, \$60,000; Siuslaw river, \$50,000; Lake Washington canal, \$335,000; ship canal connecting Port Townsend bay with Oak Harbor, \$62,500; Puget Sound and tributaries, \$25,000; Skagit river, \$10,000; Lewis and Cowlitz rivers, \$23,500; Grays river, \$500; Grays Harbor and Chehalis river, \$30,000.

Morgan May Tell of Ocean Combine

An investigation of the International Mercantile Marine, the \$120,000,000 American corporation controlling numerous foreign and American steamship companies, with J. P. Morgan as the chief witness, is contemplated by the house committee on merchant marine in connection with its hearing of the so-called shipping trust. Mr. Morgan is believed to have organized this great company and to control its stock.

National Capital Brevities

Senator Borah has introduced a bill giving settlers on government reclamation projects 30 years in which to make payment for water rights, and exempting them from payment of interest on the \$20,000,000 loan authorized a year ago.

Representative Hayes of California, has introduced a bill to amend the alien contract law. The amendment allows the entry of musicians, actors, lecturers, ministers and persons belonging to any organized learned profession.

Nearly 2,000,000 parcel post packages were sent through the postoffices of the 50 leading cities of the country in the first week of the operation of the new service, according to reports received by Postmaster-General Hitchcock.

Mortality records have been broken during the present congress. Since the sixty-second congress began Vice-president Sherman, six senators and 16 representatives have died. One representative-elect, Joel Cook, of Pennsylvania, died before congress convened.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

The coming spring will see considerable activity in the building line in Marshfield.

John E. Beesley has been appointed postmaster at Falls City and William M. Brown at Lebanon.

Pee, chief of the Umatilla Indians, died Friday at his home on the Umatilla reservation, a few miles from Pendleton.

Governor West has appointed Chas. Harding to be county judge of Lincoln county, to succeed C. H. Gardner, who recently resigned.

Representative Hawley has recommended for appointment John F. Miller as postmaster at Jacksonville, to succeed Mrs. Miller, deceased.

The seventh annual convention of the Oregon Retail Hardware & Implement Dealers' association will be held in Portland on January 21, 22, 23 and 24.

Timber Cruiser McCarthy, who has just completed cruising the timber of Coos county, reports 14,605,069,000 feet of merchantable timber in that county.

The seventh annual convention of the Oregon Retail Merchants' association takes place at Albany January 22 and 23 and promises to be the largest in their history.

Secretary of War Stimson has approved General Hixby's recommendation for a bridge across Coos bay, at Marshfield. The railroad has promised to begin work immediately.

The automobile bureau of the Secretary of State's department is swamped with the task of outfitting for the new year the 10,000 or more motor vehicles of the state with the new 1913 license tags.

L. W. Wright, a janitor at Hood River, craving cocaine, to which drug he is a slave, entered the drug store of C. A. Plata and holding up the clerk, Herman Kresse, secured a large quantity of the drug.

The state board of tax commissioners announced for 1913 the lowest state tax levy in the history of Oregon, 1.2 mills. This levy will produce \$1,986,014 on an assessed valuation placed at \$905,011,679.

Representative Hawley has secured an increase in the appropriation for the Chemawa Indian school from \$9000 to \$12,000, with the understanding that \$6000 of this amount shall be applied to improving the water supply.

To celebrate securing the \$250,000 endowment fund for Albany college, the Albany Commercial club will give a big banquet in honor of H. M. Crooks, president of the college, who directed the successful campaign.

For the establishment of the Oregon Caves National Park, to include the Oregon caves, Senator Bourne has introduced a bill setting aside township 40 south, range 6 west, Josephine county. This tract, which includes the caves, is a national monument.

Seven delegates to the National prohibition party convention, which met in Atlantic City last summer, will receive no expense vouchers from the state. The state already has paid the expenses of 10 delegates and that is the restriction which is placed by law.

Secretary of State Olcott visited Pendleton and on behalf of the state board accepted the new Eastern Oregon State Mental hospital. The big \$1,000,000 institution is now ready for occupancy, some 20 or more patients already being housed and cared for in it.

State Printer Dunway is preparing an elaborate statement which he intends to submit to the members of the legislature showing in detail the questions involved in the work of state printing and also urging that the law passed by the 1911 session be repealed.

An immense gas plant, covering 10 acres, with concrete buildings, offices and tall iron tanks, which will supply Portland with gas until 1920, is being built by the Portland Gas & Coke company at the government moorings, on the Linton road, at a cost of \$2,000,000.

Charles S. Whithill, of Portland, has written to Secretary Olcott demanding that an investigation be made of the counting of votes in Portland at the last general election. Whithill declares that 50 per cent of the votes were counted illegally. Olcott has notified him that the question is not coming under his jurisdiction.

Three hundred citizens of Redmond and the surrounding country participated Friday in the opening of the Redmond Union Warehouse company, one of the largest and most substantial buildings of the kind in the northwest. Ex-Congressman Williamson was orator of the day. The warehouse was built of stone, cost \$10,000, and will store 200,000 bushels of potatoes.

An important decision has been handed down by the Oregon supreme court in the case of Multnomah county vs. County Clerk Frank S. Fields, when the court ruled that county clerks were not required to pay naturalization fees into the county treasury. In naturalization proceedings, says the decision, the clerk acts as agent of the United States and is entitled to the fees up to \$3000 a year, the surplus over that amount going to the government.
