You must certainly experience something like a benediction. Since reading the article I have prayed blessings upon you. A dear old lady told me, referring to the hangings, "It just sickens me and I cannot get it out of my mind. The men are now dead, but I am still suffering." I wish I could express the awful effect this horrible affair has upon my sister and me and many of our friends. The thought is with us constantly—no parent save a fiend would condemn his own child to death no matter how great his crime, and why should we have less feeling for others than our own flesh and blood. However cruel a murderer may be, he does hold captive his (intended) victim for months telling him on a certain distant date he is to be hanged, put a death watch over him and it ill give him medical care and helpful attention until the fatal hour.

Financial Report of S. D. A. School.

This school is one of a system of schools, academies and colleges, established by Seventh-day Adventists to give a comprehensive education in the lower branches, in domestic science, manual training and the scripture. It is to be maintained by private subscription and tuition and is open to all worthy students who seek an education in the branches taught, irrespective of religious belief.

It has been built entirely by private donation. Because of the liberal response made by the public, and as an expression of the gratitude felt, the following report is submitted and an effort will be made to make additional reports from time to time.

The total expense to date is \$1391.27, of which \$641.27 has been donated by the church and \$600 given by the public, leaving an indebtedness of \$150. These donations have been contributed as follows: Material, \$544, labor \$276.75, cash \$420.52. In addition Jas. McFarland donated \$75 on the purchase price of the land.
