BIG WAREHOUSE OPENED AT REDMOND

Potato Storage Marks Beginning of Co-Operative Movement to Open Market Channels.

Three hundred citizens of Redmond and the surrounding county participated recently in the opening of the potato warehouse of the Redmond Union Warehouse Company, one of the largest and most substantial buildings of the kind in the northwest. With ideal weather conditions prevailing, visitors were attracted from Prineville, Bend, Powell, Butte and other centers. The dedication of the warehouse marks the beginning of a big co-operative movement among the farmers of the Central Oregon district. For a number of years big quantities of potatoes, onions, alfalfa, clover and other products have thrived bountifully, but the chief obstacle in the way of financial success has been the lack of a general market. Even with the coming of the railroads, as broad markets as are desired and are necessary failed to materialize, although a marked stimulus was given the farming industry.

Texas Places Orders. To solve the market question and to get attractive prices for their products, business men and farmers joined in the project last fall to establish a central selling agency and a general warehouse for assembling the crops of this district. The result is that a stone warehouse 90x150 feet, costing \$10,000, has been completed and substantial progress has been made in opening up a market for the products of the district. Already orders for 13 carloads of potatoes have been received from Texas. Most of the potato crop of the Redmond and Powell Butte districts, which amounted to 200,000 bushels last year, will be stored in the warehouse at once for distribution.

Ex-Congressman J. N. Williamson of Prineville as the orator of the day spoke on "The pioneer and the tenderfoot." He reviewed his experiences as a pioneer of the Central Oregon district, saying that the early settlers invariably overlooked the best opportunities and often were unwilling to adjust themselves to conditions as do the later homeseekers.

"The pioneer is the man who says our soil won't produce anything, and the tenderfoot goes ahead and raises everything," was the way Mr. Williamson defined the difference between the two.

Great Faith Is Shown. "But there is something about the men and women who go out upon these plains; out upon these vast and desolate reaches and subdue and till and plant and replant until the whole scene is reversed and whole townships of desolation are transformed into productive and happy homes. They are the men who have solved the different problems and who command my respect and excite my wonder.

L. E. Smith, president of the warehouse company, as chairman of the meeting, referred to conditions as they existed but a few years ago, when this immense territory produced little or nothing but grazing for stock. With the gradual settlement of the lands by the thrifty class of people, he said that the country had just begun to develop.

"The people have great faith in this community. They have shown their confidences by the heavy investment in the warehouse project. We have just begun to developing into a great producing section of Oregon," concluded the chairman.

A feature of the day's program was a gratuitous dinner given in behalf of the residents of the district.
