SPECIAL LEVY FOR FIFTY THREE DISTRICTS

Do Not Spend Amount of Money for School Work Required by Law.

The law provides that each school district in the state shall expend at least \$300 for school teachers, wages each year and if districts do not receive that much money from the county school fund or from a special tax the county superintendent shall report a list of such districts having such a deficiency and the county court shall make a special assessment for such districts up to five mills. It seems that there are 53 such districts in Lane county this year for which the county court will have to make such a special levy.

Bold, Bad Prowlers at Creswell Carry Away Loot in Original Manner.

The R. H. Parsons hardware store at Creswell was burglarized Monday night and guns, razors and jewelry to the value of \$125 or more were taken. Entrance was gained through the front door by breaking the glass with a pick covered with a big mitten.

The burglars also entered the Southern Pacific depot through the window, and climbed over the railing into the office, but secured nothing. They then broke open the station house, stole the speeder and used that in getting out of town. The speeder has not yet been found.

The thieves carried on their work so quietly that no one was aroused. As yet no trace of them has been found. It is supposed that the robbery was committed by the same gang that has been working in Eugene. Cottage Grove's reputation for the manner in which it handles suspicious characters seems to have kept the prowlers away from here.
