A strong demonstration has been made in favor of the proposed interstate bridge between Oregon and Washington, crossing the Columbia River at Vancouver. Joint committees from the two state legislatures went over the site chosen for the structure and looked carefully into the merits of the project. At a later meeting in Portland, attended by citizens of both states, strong support was aroused for the bridge and it seems likely the plan will be accomplished.

Conferences have been held looking to the arrangement of a date for a "Country Life Fortnight" in Portland during the fall or winter months when dairy show, land show, stock exhibits, gathering of horticulturists, creamerymen, woolgrowers, poultry and goat raisers, florists and similar organizations will be held. In this way it is thought meetings of interest to farmers can be grouped so that events in similar lines can be held simultaneously, or following each other, and those interested can attend them all without losing much time from their duties at home.

**Object to Lee M. Travis.**  
 Displeased with the personnel of the Panama-Pacific exposition appointed a year ago by Governor West, the legislators have practically reached an agreement whereby the governor will have only a limited power in the appointment of the commission to disburse the funds to be appropriated for the exposition.

Particular exception has been taken by the Lane county delegation to Lee M. Travis of Eugene, a democratic war horse of Lane county, and other legislators, upon learning the reasons for the delegation being opposed to him have joined with them in protesting. Generally the legislators seem dissatisfied also with the other members and have decided that the wisest course to pursue is to limit the governor's appointing power. This will likely be done by allowing the governor to appoint a certain number, and the president and the speaker of the house to appoint. The position is taken that the commission is too important to permit it to be appointed by any one man and especially is this so when the personnel of the present commission is considered.
