LANE REPRESENTATIVE IS STEAM ROLLERED

Temporary Speaker Angered When Spectators and Newspapers Cheer Allen Eaton.

Charging Representative Olson, chairman of the resolution committee, with having pocketed a resolution introduced Saturday and going to Portland to avoid reporting on it until Monday, and charging Representative Upton, one of the floor leaders of the organization, with having brought about its indefinite postponement without even giving him a chance to vote on it, Representative Eaton of Lane, hurled a bomb shell into the house Monday night, when he introduced a motion to have them condemned for their action.

Ruled out of order when he sought to speak on the motion Eaton appealed from the decision of Chairman Forbes, and was sustained.

Taking the floor and delivering a fiery speech in its behalf he was interrupted with such loud applause from the lobby that his voice died out amid the din. Incensed at the crowd, Chairman Forbes shouted for order but it proved unavailing. Sympathizing with Eaton in the courageous but hopeless fight he was waging against the steam roller the newspaper correspondents joined in the cheering and applause. Losing his head, Forbes directed that they be excluded from the room, and then pandemonium broke loose.

This was a signal for a general outbreak of cheers, stamping of feet and mingled in with it all were hisses for Forbes.

It was some time before order was restored. Had a vote of the audience been taken Eaton's motion would have passed by an overwhelming vote. But the steam roller crowd voted solidly against it after its leaders had personally attacked and ridiculed Eaton. The resolution that was introduced by Eaton provided that in view of the congested conditions that the appropriation bills be taken up at once and fixed their order. The organization has been holding them back as a club over the senate and governor and therefore was opposed to it.

Eaton in his speech severely arraigned Olson and Upton and declared if any other member should attempt to repeat their act during the session he would have them arrested.

SIERRA POET LIVED AT EUGENE

"Joaquin" Miller Once Edited Paper at County Seat And Which Was Suppressed.

"Joaquin" Miller of literary fame was once a resident of Eugene, and The Register of that city pays him the following tribute:

By the death of "Joaquin" Miller, American literature loses from the rolls of the living one of its most picturesque characters. "Joaquin" Miller was always a disciple of the unusual. His dress, his appearance and his manner, as well as the things that he wrote, inevitably excited interest because they were different—in many cases radically different—from the ordinary.

The name "Joaquin," by which he is known to the entire world, and by which he will continue to be known as long as the people love to read of the romantic and glorious West, is a nom de plume. His full name was Cincinnati Heine Miller. The pen name that supplanted his own was taken from his second book to be published. Its title was "Joaquin et al." and it contained a defense of Joaquin Murietta, a famous, or possibly infamous, outlaw, who terrorized California for 10 years.

"Joaquin" Miller's early history is closely interwoven with the early days of Eugene. He was a student at the old Columbia College that stood on College Hill, and that gave that part of the city its name. He studied law in the office of George H. Williams, at that time a resident of Eugene and who later became attorney-general of the United States. For some time he edited a weekly paper here known as the Democratic Register. The paper was suppressed because of seditious editorials that it published. He was a vivid, romantic character, and his writings were strongly colored by his personality. He told the story of the west, and he told it intimately, for he knew it well.

TIMBER LANDS ARE RELEASED

Attorney General Wickersham accepted yesterday by specific authority of congress, compromises in 22 suits involving title to a total of 316,000 acres of valuable timber land in western Oregon, originally included in the land grant of the Oregon and California railroad. The agreement provides that the claimants to the land who were found to be innocent purchasers will submit to a decree surrendering title to the United States and then be permitted to purchase it back at \$2.50 per acre.
