COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

(Official Publication.)

Regular meeting of the City Council Feb. 3, 1913.

Minutes of January meeting read and approved.

The Mayor announced the appointment of the following Park Committee: N. H. Martin, R. M. Veatch, Mrs. A. B. Wood, T. C. Wheeler and John Spray.

The following bills were read, referred to the finance committee and allowed:

N. H. Martin, chairman of the Street Committee, reported that it had granted J. W. Veatch permission to erect poles as petitioned for and on motion the action of the Street Committee was approved with the understanding that the poles should be removed at any time required.

On motion the City Attorney was instructed to draw an ordinance providing a penalty for allowing cattle or other stock to trespass on street parkings or other private property while being driven through the streets.

On motion it was ordered that the rock quarry be in the hands of the Street Committee for the ensuing year and that they take up with the county court the matter of furnishing rock for the county.

Mr. Spray addressed the Council in regard to the widening of East Main Street. On motion the City Attorney was instructed to proceed with the collection of a street assessment from Mr. Larson on East Main Street, and that it is the sense of this Council that if no bids be received at the sale of this property that the City bid it in for the amount of the assessment.

On motion the Street Committee was instructed to employ an engineer and have the necessary survey and plat made for the widening of East Main Street.

Councilman King was appointed a committee of one to interview the Southern Pacific Railroad company in regard to establishing a crossing bell at Sixth Street railroad crossing.

On motion it was ordered that the Mayor with a committee of two look into the matter of buying a team for the use of the city, and to make arrangements to have the streets cleaned if necessary until other arrangements are made.

Councilmen Martin and Knowles were appointed the committee.

On motion Council adjourned to Feb. 10, 1913.

Special meeting Feb. 10, 1913:

Ordinance No. 368, being an ordinance for the relief of the Nesmith County Committee, was read a third time and on roll call the ordinance was defeated.

A bid was received from Ambrose & Burdall for \$19,000 street improvement bonds and from H. Venske for the amount of bonds issued on the amount of work done by him, both bids being at par with accrued interest. On motion the bids were accepted.

On motion the Water Commissioner was instructed to put in water tap at the Dorena school and to give them a rate of \$1.00 per month, but to notify them that this rate might be raised at a later date.

The special committee appointed to investigate the matter of purchase of a team for the city reported adversely. On motion the report of committee was adopted and committee discharged.

On motion the matter of making arrangements with the Methodist Church for sidewalk on private property belonging to the church was referred to the Mayor and City Attorney.

On motion Council adjourned.

LANE SALARIES RAISED BY LEGISLATIVE MEASURE

Salem, Ore., Feb. 15.—The county salary measure, which classifies the thirty-four counties in the state according to population and assessed valuation, and fixes the salaries of all county officials in each class at the same figure, has passed the house.

Multnomah county, the only one in the first class, is not affected by the bill at present.

For Lane and Marion, in the second class, the salaries are: Sheriff, \$2000; clerk, \$1800, (now \$2000); assessor, \$1800; judge, \$1600; school superintendent, \$1600; treasurer, \$1200.

In the third class, comprising Clackamas, Douglas, Jackson, Linn and Umatilla, salaries for the same officials are, respectively, \$1900, \$1700, \$1500, \$1500 and \$1400.
