Uncounted Years Old.

The work of the United States geo-
logical survey in paleontology—the
study of fossil remains of animals and
plants that lived ages ago—has a dis-
tinct bearing on some of the very prac-
tical economic problems of today.

The descriptive paleontologic reports
are often treated as "pure science,"
yet instructive, striking, or tedious as
may be these delineations of the
groups of animal or plant life which
lived on the globe in some particular
epoch, there is not one of these papers
describing the fauna or flora of a for-
mation that does not prove sooner or
later to possess practical value and to
be essential to geology in its constantly
increasing refinement of study and re-
sults.

Without paleontology the geo-
logic classification of formations, their
correlation, and the determination of
their mutual relations would be impos-
sible. In fact, real and symmetrical
progress in geology is impossible with-
out corresponding interrelated develop-
ment and refinement of its handmaid
paleontology. The study of the eco-
nomic geology of any region of com-
plicated structure is blind and conse-
quent unless the time relations of the
strata concerned are known. These
relations are indicated by the fossils
which the strata contain. (From
thirty-third annual report director U.
S. geological survey.)

Mirrors Made in Oregon.

Not many Oregon people know that
all kinds of mirrors and looking glasses
are made in this state. The industry
has been developed until half a dozen
firms are engaged in the business and
some of them are supplying other
manufacturers with mirrors to use in
making up doors, furniture, and finish-
ing the interior of offices and dwellings.
In the new hotel and cafe dining rooms,
in buffets and confectioneries, large
quantities of mirrors are employed and
even in the exterior decorations of
store fronts and entrances. Oregon
has not yet a glass factory, but capi-
talists are in the state to investigate
the conditions for the manufacture of
mirrors, the grinding, polishing, plat-
ing and cutting of sizes is all done in
the factories now in Oregon.

How to Make Whipped Cream Salad Dressing.

The following recipe for making
whipped cream salad dressing was
given the farmers' wives attending the
short course cooking classes at the
Oregon Agricultural College.

Beat the yolks of 3 eggs until thick
and lemon colored. Add 2 teaspoons
of sugar mixed with 1/2 a teaspoon of
salt, the same of mustard and a speck
of cayenne pepper. Pour over this half
a cup of hot vinegar in which a tea-
spoon of butter has been melted. If
desired instead of vinegar, 1/2 of a cup
of lemon juice and 1/2 of a cup of boiling
water may be used. If it is not thick
enough it may be cooked, then chilled,
and just before serving whipped
cream is added; 1/2 cup of heavy cream
is sufficient.

Sells Big Lane County Farm.

Robert Boyd, who is said by his ac-
quaintances in this city to be worth a
million and a half, sold the fine 800
ranch, known as the J. R. Hills place
about five miles southwest of Junction
City to an Iowa syndicate for some-
thing over \$30,000. The place will be
set out to fruit and will probably be
platted or subdivided and sold out.
Mr. Boyd bought the place some four
years ago and counting what he has
received from crops he has cleared up
in the transaction about \$20,000. Mr.
Boyd has been in Portland making the
trade and while there bought a 260
acre fruit farm not far from Yamhill
for something like \$30,000. He is a
great Willamette valley booster and if
he can see his way clear and arrange
his business interests, he may come to
Oregon to reside on his Yamhill fruit
farm.—Register.
