Junction City After Cannery.

Recently the Junction City Grange voted unanimously in favor of organizing a Junction City Cooperation Cannery Association, and the following temporary officers were appointed: President, Chris Myhre; vice president and treasurer, Edward L. Ayers; secretary, Dr. W. W. Haicha. These officials were given power to act and make all necessary arrangements to incorporate.

Through the efforts of these officials, the Lane County Horticultural Association will meet in Junction City Wednesday, March 5, under the auspices of the Junction City Grange. This meeting will be held in Oddfellows Hall and will start promptly at 1 p. m. It is the plan to effect a permanent organization of the cannery association at this time.

After a permanent organization is effected it will be decided whether a building will be erected next summer or not. In case a building is not put up all fruits will be shipped to the Eugene cannery at a specified price and a building will be erected in Junction City the following season.

Large Addition to Cannery.

The board of directors of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association met Saturday, and went over last year's business, concluded that it will be impossible to carry on the business as it should be done next year with the room now available and decided to build an addition to the plant 40x80 feet and two stories high. It will be built along the south side of the present building and fitted up for the work as the manager shall decide. In order to secure money to do this building, the association will place on the market 250 shares of its stock which will be sold at par, \$10 per share. These shares may be bought by anyone who cares to become interested in the business. The stock has been held at a premium for some time as the association has been paying good dividends.

Highest and Lowest Points in the World.

The maximum difference in elevation of land in the United States is 14,777 feet, according to the United States Geological Survey. Mount Whitney, the highest point, is 14,501 feet above sea level, and a point in Death Valley is 276 feet below sea level. These two points, which are both in California, are less than 90 miles apart. This difference is small, however, as compared with the figures for Asia. Mount Everest rises 29,002 feet above sea level, whereas the shores of the Dead Sea are 1,290 feet below sea level, a total difference in land heights of 30,292 feet. Mount Everest has never been climbed.

The greatest ocean depth yet found is 32,088 feet, at a point about 40 miles north of the island of Mindanao, in the Philippine Islands. The ocean bottom at this point is therefore more than 11½ miles below the summit of Mount Everest.

The difference in the land heights in Europe is about 15,868 feet.

J. I. Jones was yesterday appointed administrator of the estate of his deceased father, Crampton B. Jones. The estate is said to be worth about \$5,000 and there are a number of heirs. C. C. Conner, J. E. Lewis and L. P. Orpud were named as appraisers.
