PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 26.—Ed. Sentinel: I wish to describe another enjoyable trip taken by the Mazamas, this time to Celilo. There were 46 in the party, including myself.

After taking a bird's eye view of the surrounding country, we went to the cars, where dinner was served in elegant style. Mandolin and guitar music was furnished by members of the club. Half of the party took a belated train for Portland Sunday night, and the remainder of the party came in Monday morning. It was a very enjoyable trip indeed.
