After a long sickness Simeon Harlan died at his home in South Drain, about 2 o'clock Monday morning, March 3.

Mr. Harlan was born July 25, 1835, in Dark County, Ohio. In 1863 he crossed the plains with an ox team to California, where he lived some years, coming to Drain in 1875, where he has lived since. On March 1st, 1855, he married Miss Mary Miller, who died March 8, 1907. From this union there were eight children, six of whom are now living, 11 grand-children and five great-grand-children. ## BUYS AT SPRINGFIELD

RINEHART PAYS \$20,000 FOR MAIN PROPERTY

Cottage Grove Man Invests Heavily in Sister City's Real Estate.

W. N. Rinehart, of this city, last week closed the largest deal in Springfield Main Street property made this year, involving more than \$20,000. This purchase gives Mr. Rinehart the two opposite corners at Main and Seventh. The north frontage is 64 feet, while the corner on the opposite side of the street with a south front is 100x120 feet.

While it is not definitely known what Mr. Rinehart's plans are regarding the improvement of his property, it is generally believed that the land will not remain vacant for long. Those who are in close touch and claim to be on the inside claim that a fine brick block will be erected on the south side of the street in the early spring for store purposes, while on the opposite corner a three-story hotel will be erected at once. It is also known that Mr. Rinehart and his associates are about to close a deal whereby they will come in possession of between 500 and 1,000 acres of fine farm lands lying close to Springfield. This large tract will be subdivided into five and ten acre tracts and will then be placed on the market. Arrangements have also been made with the street car company to run an electric line from Springfield through the tract, thereby giving the small ranchers the convenience of city life. This will mean much for Springfield, as it will, when the tract is populated, add nearly 100 families to the population.

## In Underclothes He Escapes

Clad only in underclothing, a Mexican being taken to Salem from Coquille escaped from a hotel in Drain, according to the Nonpareil. After eluding officers and bloodhounds he was found in another hotel, where he had appropriated some clothing and was ready to make his getaway.  
The prisoner had been taken into the home of Sheriff Gage at Coquille and cared for while sick. Upon convalescing he returned the kindness of his benefactor by stealing a watch, and for this he was given an indeterminate sentence of from one to three years. While taking the prisoner to the pen the sheriff stopped over night in Drain. The prisoner was divested of everything but his underclothes and locked in a room, but lack of raiment did not worry him when bent on escape.
