GROVE MEN SPEAK AT CRESWELL Get-Together Banquet Is Highly Successful Affair.

Creswell, Ore., March 14.—Cooperation was the keynote that was struck at the annual banquet of the Creswell Commercial Club last night, and today everyone in this thriving little town feels a little more certain that cooperation will win all the things that Creswell wants.

The banquet was without doubt the most successful and the best attended that has ever been held here. Covers were laid for 125, and there were no vacant places. This is considered a remarkable number in a community of this size. A fine spirit was evident, and there was keen interest in the problems that were discussed by the speakers.

L. P. Harrington, president of the Commercial club, presided as toastmaster, and his introductions of the speakers were apt and witty. The visitors to the city were welcomed by Mayor George L. Gilfrey in a well turned speech. President P. L. Campbell of the University of Oregon, spoke on "The Soil and the School." "Promotion Work that Pays," was discussed by M. J. Duryea, manager of the promotion department of the Eugene Commercial club. Hon. C. J. Hurd, a member of the Lane County delegation at Salem, told of the good roads legislation. "Learning by Doing," was the subject of the toast to which B. S. Wakefield, superintendent of the Creswell schools responded. "How We May Co-Operate to Help Creswell," was told by Rev. F. L. Fraser, pastor of the Presbyterian church, and "Some Needed Reforms," was outlined by Hon. Allen Eaton, representative from Lane county.

Other speakers were Elbert Bede, the editor of the Cottage Grove Sentinel, C. E. Stewart of Cottage Grove and C. H. Sedgwick, secretary of the Creswell Commercial club. One of the features of the banquet was the singing of the song: "Hail, Creswell, Oregon!"
