WOULD HAVE PUPILS SURVEY STATE

University Professor Suggests Putting Students to Work on Underdeveloped Resources.

Carl McClain, assistant professor of civil engineering at the University of Oregon, has launched a campaign among the students and faculty towards having all the field work in his department done in the summer time, instead of during the regular school year. Students are handicapped in their field work under the present system, according to Mr. McClain, by the periods of intermission between their hours in the field. Also, he feels that too much time is lost going to and from their work.

Classes in surveying generally have from one to three afternoons in the field each week. As the advance class must go out into the country for their work, about a third of the time is spent in going and coming. As each student is given a turn at the transit alternately while others act as front and rear chainmen and rod men, two weeks often intervene between experiences with the transit.

Mr. McClain's plan is to take the boys into camp in the summer. Oregon, as a state, is largely unsurveyed, wherefore it will be possible for the classes to engage in work of the utmost public importance instead of working out tramped-up problems. Mr. McClain hopes to have his crews gather exact data on the water power and irrigation possibilities of many streams, and assist the state engineer wherever possible in the gigantic task of mapping the resources of Oregon's hills and valleys.

CHILDREN'S EXHIBITS GO TO STATE FAIR FREE

The S. P., the O. W. R. & N. and the Hill lines in Oregon, including the Astoria line, the Oregon Electric and the United Railways, have all agreed to carry the school children's exhibits to and from the state fair this year free of charge.

In order to take advantage of this liberal offer the exhibits of a certain county, or district, must be assembled at one or more convenient shipping points and shipped together in the name of the county school superintendent, teacher or other authorized person.

Besides the regular and special prizes in the individual classes, there are five cash prizes ranging from \$100 down to \$40 for the best collective exhibit by the schools for any county. There are also five special prizes for the best exhibit by one room districts outside of counties making a county exhibit.

University Co-Ed Is Grandmother

The first co-ed in the history of the University of Oregon, so far as is known, to be a grandmother is Mrs. Ella A. Stearns, who has returned from Portland, where she visited the son of her daughter, Mrs. Stanley C. G. Smith, born Monday evening. Mrs. Stearns as a University co-ed is registered in the University School of Journalism, carrying a regular course, although at the same time she serves as house mother at the woman's dormitory.

Mrs. Stearns, 25 years ago, was a newspaper woman, employed upon the Portland Oregonian. She finds though that journalism in a quarter of a century has changed, and that to again become acquainted with it she is studying with the University freshmen in the first year journalism class. Her daughter, now Mrs. Smith, has also served a newspaper career, being society editor upon the Portland Oregonian over a year and a half.

Although Mrs. Stearns is the only university student to be a grandmother, she is not the only one to be a mother. Several of the students this year are married men and women with children. The one best known is Charles Loundagin a 35-year old father of two children who wears a freshman green cap.

BIG ANIMAL KILLED WITH SMALL CALIBER RIFLE

Trapper on Umpqua Has Exciting Experience When He Puts 22 Shots Into Big Cat.

A 22-caliber rifle is the smallest gun in general use but it was used last week to lay low one of the largest cougars ever killed in Douglas County. Wm. Ramsey, who is trapping on the Umpqua near Scottsburg, secured the pelt, 22 shots being used before the last of the fight was taken out of the animal. Had it not been for the trapper's two dogs, a hand-to-hand fight might have resulted and the man might not have come out of the fray. The animal measured eleven feet, from tip to tip.

FOREST FIRE LAW IS MISREPRESENTED

State Forester Elliott Calls Attention to Frauds by Selfish Timber Brokers.

State Forester Elliott has issued the following statement regarding misrepresentations being made concerning the compulsory patrol law:

It has been brought to the attention of the state forester that some unscrupulous timber brokers are misrepresenting the provisions of the compulsory patrol law which was enacted by the recent legislative assembly and becomes effective June 2. Owners of timber claims have been told that under this law it will be necessary for them to keep a patrolman on their claims all summer at their own expense, and this has been urged as a reason for sacrifice sales. Statements of this kind are made purely for the purpose of stimulating the sale of timberlands, thus increasing the business and incidentally the commissions of timber brokers.

The law provides that every timberland owner in the state, not residing within one-half mile of his property, shall furnish a sufficient patrol therefor during the dry season, and that in case he fails to do so the state forester shall provide the same at a cost not to exceed 5 cents per acre per annum. Any amount so paid by the state shall be a lien upon the land and shall be collected with the next taxes.

It is obvious that the maximum expense to the owner of a quarter-section of timberland can not exceed \$8.00 per year, an amount that should scare no owner into disposing of his timber claim at a sacrifice.

One of the best ways for timberland owners to comply with the law is to join county fire patrol associations that have been organized in most of the timbered counties of the state. It is expected that every timbered county will have such an organization before the fire season arrives. The experience of these associations, some of which have been in existence for four years, proves that adequate patrol can be secured at a cost of from 1 1/2 to 3 1/2 cents an acre, and if all of the timberland owners join, the acreage cost will be materially decreased. Protection from fire at a cost of \$3.00 or \$4.00 per quarter-section should be welcomed by all timberland owners, and it is hoped that no one will be induced to sell their holdings through misrepresentations made by unreliable timber brokers for the selfish purpose of increasing commissions.

MANY COLONISTS ARE ARRIVING

Portland Chamber of Commerce Mecca of New Comers.

Extra assistants are already demanded in the exhibit department of the Portland Chamber of Commerce to receive immigrants who are beginning to arrive, and to answer their questions. Ordinarily two men are employed in the exhibit room to show visitors through the department, answer questions and supply them with printed information. Yesterday the secretary of the chamber and assistant secretary were obliged to assist the two regular workers in handling the crowds that appeared seeking information. At one time there were 50 colonists in the exhibit room seeking literature and asking questions about Oregon. They were mostly from Minnesota, Nebraska and Montana and there was a fair representation of New Yorkers also.

"Although the weather that greeted them," says the assistant secretary, "was not the kind they were led to expect, everyone expressed himself as delighted with the Oregon country, climate and the character of the people they are meeting. Most of them have cut every tie which bound them to their old homes, having sold their farms and places of business and emigrated to Oregon with their families and personal possessions.

"As they wandered through the exhibit they expressed surprise at the variety of Oregon's resources. The dry farming exhibit of Tillman Reuter was of especial interest. They asked numerous questions regarding the methods used in dry farming. Some were particularly taken with the vegetable display and expressed their intention of going into diversified farming. All appear to have a fixed point in view as to their future home."

A number of students of the Oregon Agricultural College at Corvallis were interested visitors. They were agreeably surprised at the magnitude of the exhibit and at the variety of the display.

The Chamber of Commerce is lending every effort to properly care for the strangers and is receiving the cooperation of the hotels in this regard. Cards announcing the location of its exhibit are on display in all of the hotels and the employees at the depots are directing homeseekers and tourists to the chamber for information.
