LOGANBERRIES BEAR PROLIFICLY

Brooks Grower Gets Gross Return
of \$488 Per Acre.

"I gathered an average of twelve thousand two hundred pounds of ripe loganberries from each acre of my yard last summer."

This is the startling statement made by A. M. La Follette, the well known fruitgrower of Mission Bottom at Salem.

"These are the weights furnished me by the cannery people, mind you, to whom I sold the crop," he continued, "and from whom I received pay at four cents per pound, footing up to \$488 gross per acre, or about \$360 net returns."

It is clearly seen that when Judge Logan of Santa Cruz, California, placed the almost invisible pollen of a red raspberry bloom on the blossom of a species of wild blackberry he performed what may, in a sense, be regarded as a horticultural miracle. It was from the seed of the fruit resulting from this cross pollenization that the loganberry sprang, which, in quality and yield, has few equals, and is in great favor with consumer as well as with the commercial grower.

Mother Who Sent Tot for Funds Hewing Out Home in Wilderness

"The other children are now with us. They came the 16th of last month, and the man and woman they had been staying with came with them to bring them. They took us completely by surprise, as we did not know they were coming until they were at the door. Oh, how glad I was to see my babies!"
