UNITED STATES MAY INTERFERE

National Government Sees Danger in Proposed California Japanese Legislation

Sacramento, Cal.—Two new bills dealing with the question of land ownership by aliens in California, such representing the view of a considerable faction in the legislature, will be offered to the senate and voted on.

Through an agreement reached by leaders of the majority party, a drastic law directed solely against the Japanese and Chinese will be proposed as a substitute for the Thompson-Birdsall measure and probably will be passed.

It is planned to throw out entirely the guarded language of Thompson-Birdsall and put in its place two simple prohibitions:

First—No alien who is ineligible to citizenship shall be permitted to acquire and hold land in California, for a period of more than one year after date of such acquisition.

Second—No corporation, the majority of the stock of which is held by aliens who are ineligible to citizenship, shall be permitted to acquire and hold lands except for one year.

Governor Johnson gave out a statement in which he declared that California was only doing what other states have done in restricting ownership of land by aliens and said that Californians are unable to understand why an act admittedly within the jurisdiction of the California legislature, like the passage of an alien land bill, creates tumult, confusion and criticism.

LORD CHURCHILL ROBBED

England's First Admiralty Lord Loses Naval Data.

London.—Winston Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, has been the victim of a most daring and sensational robbery, in which a beautiful and mysterious young woman is suspected as the possible agent of some foreign power.

By the theft the first lord of the admiralty not only loses \$2500 in money, but highly important confidential naval data, such as might eagerly be sought as of greatest value to any nation not too friendly with Great Britain.

The first lord of the admiralty met with his misfortune immediately after having won money at cards on the Riviera recently.

Pope is Much Better.

Rome.—So much improvement was found in the condition of the Pope by Drs. Marchisavi and Amici that they did not consider it necessary to issue a bulletin.

MORGAN'S WILL ASSERTS FAITH

New York.—"I commit my soul into the hands of my Savior in full confidence—that, having redeemed it and washed it in his most precious blood, he will present it faultless before the throne of my Heavenly Father; and I entreat children to maintain and defend, at all hazard, and at any cost of personal sacrifice, the blessed doctrine of the complete atonement for sin through the blood of Jesus Christ, once offered, and through that alone."

This is the extraordinary and striking utterance which begins the last will and testament of John Pierpont Morgan.

The amount of trusts and bequests named by specific sums is under \$20,000,000, but the entire residue of the estate, estimated at \$1,000,000,000 is left to J. P. Morgan, Jr.

The largest individual settlements are made upon the son and three daughters.

Each of the four children receives in trust \$3,000,000 to use the income as he or she pleases.

Mrs. Morgan, the great financier's second wife, is made the beneficiary of a trust fund large enough to insure her an income of \$100,000 a year.

The two sons-in-law, Satterlee and Hamilton, are given \$1,000,000 each.

The assistants and servants in the Morgan households and institutions are provided for liberally.

Knox Bill Refused.

Sacramento, Cal.—Through the Panama-Pacific Exposition commission state has refused to participate in the expenses of ex-Secretary of State Philander C. Knox, who visited California last May ostensibly to boost the exposition, on the ground that that official used the occasion to aid President Taft's political aspirations.

Tommy Murphy Defeats Wolgast.

San Francisco.—For 16 rounds "Harlem" Tommy Murphy and Ad Wolgast battled, with little to choose between them. Then a missed right swing by the one-time champion was his undoing and paved the way for a fight-end decision in favor of Murphy.

TORNOW KILLED BY DEPUTY

Autopsy Brought to Light That Three Bullets Hit the Outlaw.

Montesano, Wash.—John Tornow, outlaw, has paid the penalty for six murders. His body, together with those of his two last victims, Louis Blair and Charles Lathrop, was packed out of his hermit retreat in the mountains.

The autopsy, performed by a number of physicians of the county, brought to light that Tornow had been hit three times with bullets. The first one to strike him fractured his skull and cut away a portion of his hair. The next bullet, possibly the sixth shot fired by Giles Quimby, a deputy sheriff, struck the outlaw in the neck, passing out just under the skin under the right shoulder blade. The final bullet, which killed the murderer, entered the left side of the head under the ear and came out at the top of the head.

ABROGATION OF TREATIES SOUGHT

Washington.—A demand for abrogation of two treaties with Great Britain bearing upon Isthmian canal rights presented to the Senate in a resolution by Senator Chamberlain, brought a new element to the canal controversy now in progress between this country and Great Britain over the right of the United States to exempt American coastwise ships from the payment of tolls.

Senator O'Gorman, chairman of the interoceanic canal committee which must handle canal legislation in the senate, endorsed the principle embodied in the Chamberlain resolution.

The Chamberlain resolution would require the president to proceed at once to terminate the Hay-Pauncefote treaty of 1901 and the Clayton-Bulwer treaty of 1852, which it superseded. In a statement, Senator Chamberlain said the treaties and records would show that the United States never planned to give Great Britain such treaty rights as would justify the protests that country had made.

MINNESOTA GOVERNOR LOSES

Public Utilities Control Bill Passed Over Veto by House.

St. Paul, Minn.—The lower house of the Minnesota legislature repassed over the governor's veto the telephone control bill and the bill providing for the municipal control of public utilities.

Governor Eberhart, in vetoing both bills, gave as his principal reason the belief that the regulation of public utilities should be left to the state. He has voiced his determination of calling an extra session, probably late in the summer, to pass such a measure.

John Mitchell Appointed.

Albany, N. Y.—John Mitchell, ex-president of the United Mine Workers of America and a vice-president of the American Federation of Labor, was designated by Governor Sulzer to be state labor commissioner.

COLONIST SEASON AT END

APPROXIMATELY 10,000 NEW-COMERS REACH OREGON

While Number Arriving From East Shows No Increase, Percentage of Settlers Greater.

With the arrival of the late trains last week from the East the influx of colonists as a result of this season's reduced one-way rates came to an end.

In many respects it can be considered one of the most successful colonist seasons in the history of Oregon—not in point of numbers, but in the class of homeseekers who came.

More than 70 per cent who traveled on colonist tickets this spring went on the land. In former years this average did not reach 50 per cent. The railroads have been making a united effort recently to discourage eastern people from locating in the cities of the north-west and have confined their efforts almost entirely to offering inducements to men who are not afraid to locate on a farm.

As a result several thousand new farmers have come to Oregon and Southwest Washington. Most of them will remain permanently.

Central Oregon received a greater influx this spring than ever before, but still it is not up to the volume of movement sought by the railroads. As a matter of fact, Central Oregon is not settling up as rapidly as was expected.

The colonist movement this spring was at no time extraordinarily heavy, but it was remarkably steady. An average of about 500 new arrivals daily was maintained during the first five and the last five days of the season. The average during the remaining 20 days was approximately 250 on all lines.

This furnishes a total of approximately 10,000 settlers for Oregon.

Oregon Prune Orchard Survey Report Out.

The report of the survey of the prune planting of Oregon occupies the first 30 pages in the biennial crop pest and horticultural report of the O. A. C. experiment station just published. It is the first of the 8 chapters devoted to horticultural research, which also include frost fighting, frost injury, tomato investigations, fruit evaporation, loganberry culture, variety adaptation and bud variation.

The division of horticulture has also under way experiments on the fruit pit and winter injury, irrigation of the apple, soil fertility, including the use of fertilizers in apple and prune orchards, cover crops and shade crops, the use of manures and composts, plant breeding of apples, pears, cherries, and prunes, evaporation of loganberries, nut culture, vegetable investigations as to forcing, winter protection, and other problems, and fertilizers for onion fields. Reports on these investigations probably will not be ready for several years.

The prune survey report is illustrated with 8 photographs and 12 tables setting forth conditions in the 9 counties where the survey statistics were collected: Douglas, Lane, Marion, Lincoln, Wasco, Union, Yamhill, Polk and Washington. Some 700 orchards were covered and the field work continued 4 months, with the object of finding out the true status of the prune industry today. A great renewal of interest in prunes was found, although opinion as to the best practices to be followed varies.
