SCHOOL DISTRICT BONDING REGULATIONS

If a majority of the votes cast read "Bonds—Yes," the board of directors, as soon as practicable, shall issue coupon bond of the district, not exceeding in par value the amount stated in the notice of election, bearing interest not to exceed legal interest per annum, payable semi-annually, redeemable at the pleasure of said district (after ten years), but due and payable absolutely twenty years from date; but in no case shall the aggregate of bonded debt in any school district exceed five per centum of the value of the taxable property of any such district. The principal and interest of such bonds shall be payable at the office of the county treasurer in which the district may be situated, or at such place as may be designated in the city and state of New York, at the option of the purchaser thereof. All such bonds so issued shall be signed by the chairman of the board

of directors and attested by the district clerk, and countersigned by the county treasurer; and ten coupons attached to said bonds shall be signed by the chairman of said board of directors and countersigned by the district by original or facsimile signatures. Whenever a school district shall issue bonds under the provisions of this section, all such bonds shall be issued to the county treasurer of the county and be registered by him in a book kept for that purpose in his office, noting the school district, amount, date, time and place of payment, rate of interest and such other facts as may be deemed proper; and all such bonds shall state on their face that they were issued under the provisions of this section. OREGON AT LAST PRODUCES ITS OWN PORK

During Year 1911 Half of Pork Came from Nebraska; None Now Shipped In.

Since last August not a hog has been imported into this state. This is the encouraging news made public the past week by C. C. Colt, head of the Union Meat Co., Portland, who says Oregon farmers are going extensively into the business of livestock raising.

During 1911, more than half the total number of hogs received at the Portland market came from Nebraska. Last year, this number decreased to a remarkable extent and now it appears that Oregon will not need to import any more pork in order to feed its own people. On the other hand, we may soon be in position to make substantial shipments outside the state.

Mr. Colt submitted figures showing that the livestock industry in Oregon is five times greater than fruit growing and greater than wheat, wool and dairy products combined.

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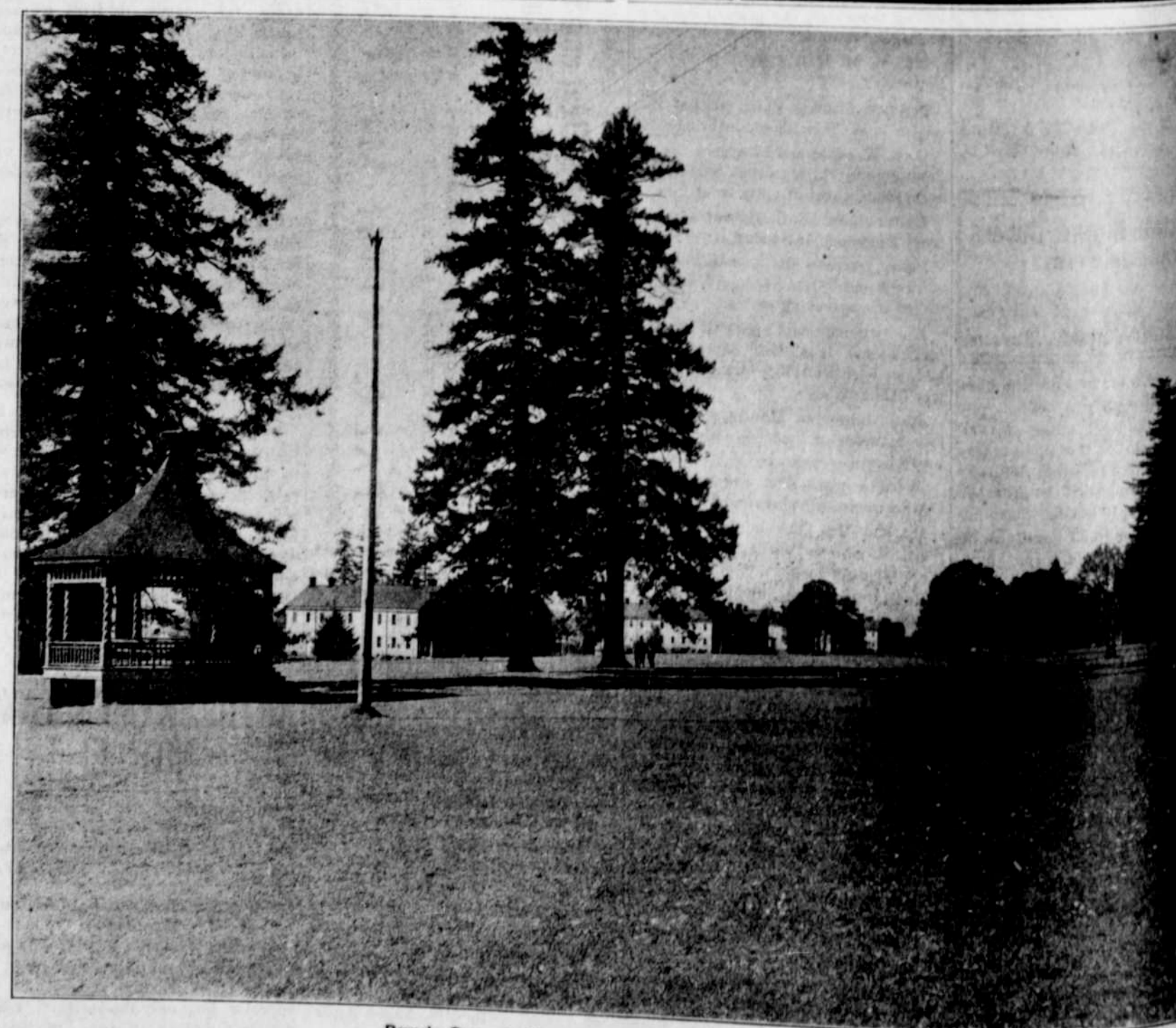
