BRYAN'S MISSION NOT SUCCESSFUL

Majority in California Legislature Still in Favor of Alien Laws

Sacramento.-California in the fullness of her right as a state, may enact rigid land law barring Orientals from ownership, but such action would be against the earnest wish of President Wilson and the national adminis-

This is the substance of the message from Washington which W. J. Bryan secretary of state and personal representative of the president, delivered to a secret conference attended only by Governor Johnson, Lieutenant-Governor Wallace and the 120 members of the state legislature.

Secretary Bryan's mission, however, seems to have failed, insofar as preventing action by the California legislature, as gleaned from a review of the proceedings. Governor Johnson sounded the keynote of the position of the majority party in a brief but intense speech in defense of California's position at the end of an all-day discussion with Secretary Bryan. He told Secretary Bryan that the right of California to follow the lead of other states was unquestioned, and declared that such a course now seems assured.

The address was brief, but it indicated plainly that the opinion of the governor remained unchanged by the

arguments put forward by Mr. Bryan. Those who expected Secretary Bryan to expound a new theory of states' rights were disappointed, as were those who expected threats of war or other sinister predictions.

Advice in the name of President Wilson was all that Secretary Bryan had to offer, and the paramount question here is whether such advice will overcome the previously announced intention of the Republican majority to enact an alien land-holding law along lines already agreed upon.

Friedmann Said to Have Sold Rights. New York.-Dr. Frederick Franz Friedmann is reported to have sold the American rights for the sale of his turtle serum for \$1,925,000 to the Eisner-Mendelson company of this city. He received \$125,000 in cash and the balance in stock in the 36 Friedmann institutes which will be established in as many states, with a total capitalization of \$5,400,000. REORGANIZED ROAD LIABLE

Northern Pacific as Railway Company Must Pay Obligation as "Railroad." Washington.-In a decision of momentous importance, especially as to railroads, the supreme court laid down the general principle that a creditor of a corporation, not a party to its reorganization, may hold its successor for its debt.

In this specific case, the court, 5 to 4, in a decision which Justice Lurton, who dissented, declared "was alarming," held the Northern Pacific railway company responsible for \$125,000 judgment against the Northern Pacific railroad company, which it succeeded, despite the fact that the court expressly stated that no moral wrongdoing was to be found in the reorgan-

Corporation lawyers who heard the decision declared it was a direct blow at the practice of reorganizing corpor-


