**DEMENTED JUNCTION CITY YOUNG
 WOMAN HANGS SELF FROM
 GARDEN GATE**

 The sudden and mysterious disap-
 pearance of a prominent young lady of
 the town last night threw the members
 of her family into a pandemonium of
 fright and alarm.

Later she was found hanging.
 Members of the family discovered
 that their daughter was missing at a
 late hour last night. Previous to the
 time her absence was noted the family
 had been enjoying a pleasant evening
 in the parlor of their home. About
 7:30 o'clock the beautiful and charming
 daughter started out of the room with-
 out asking any formal leave, but the
 father and mother did not notice any-
 thing peculiar in her conduct.

At a late hour she had not returned
 and the waiting parents became
 alarmed. After calling for her several
 times without receiving a response, a
 diligent search was begun. Her
 whereabouts could not be learned and
 the marshal was notified of her sudden
 and mysterious disappearance.

Questioned as to whether the missing
 girl's actions had been queer or out
 of ordinary of late brought out the in-
 formation that she had apparently been
 perfectly normal in all respects up to
 the moment of her disappearance.

After the circumstances of her dis-
 appearance had been related, a search
 was quietly instigated, so that if pos-
 sible, she might be located and re-
 turned without the publicity and no-
 toriety which always attends such oc-
 currences as this.

The most peculiar feature of the un-
 fortunate case, however, was that with
 all the widespread search, she was
 found hanging directly at the rear of
 her own home, where in the intense
 excitement of the first realization of
 her disappearance no one had thought
 to look.

It seems that after the officers and
 others had left the house to search for
 the young woman, her mother, in a
 mental anguish that can only be
 imagined, ran from the back door, to
 go to a neighbor's home, and, as she
 crossed the back yard, she found her
 daughter hanging.

**REV. BEATTY WRITES OF INDIAN
 MISSION WORK**

**Isolated from Friends and Relatives
 News of Cottage Grove Country
 Brings Much Pleasure.**

Bonanza, Ore., May 26.—Cottage
 Grove Sentinel: The long ago prom-
 ised letter is here but not much in it.
 It is now beginning to feel like sum-
 mer. We have had much snow and
 frost since we came here. The trip in
 was long and tiresome over snow and
 ice. We arrived in a blizzard and all
 took severe colds. I have been very
 busy since our arrival; have averaged
 one funeral a week, preached two
 times every Sunday; at Whiskey
 Creek in the morning four miles from
 here; in the afternoon at Yainax about
 six miles further. Then we have a ten
 mile drive home. We Indians are mak-
 ing plans for Decoration Day next
 Friday. This will be a big day. Wish
 we could have The Sentinel to write
 up. I would say boost, but this coun-
 try boosts itself. If all of the white
 people could get land here who are
 seeking it, it would soon come to its
 own. We are in or near the center of
 a large basin. Snow mountains all
 around us, Sprague River winding like
 a huge snake north of us with Lycan
 River emptying here. Pure spring
 water rushes through the Coyotes
 Focket gorge. There are many points
 of interest here. The Indians come
 in and tell us their old stories, some-
 thing new all the time. There is no
 part of Oregon so little known or more
 isolated than this has been, but there
 are some things happening to make it
 more pleasant. The Lake View stage
 line from Klamath Falls passes within
 about one-fourth of a mile of our home
 every day, so that our friends can
 reach us easily. We can go out when
 we desire and get our mail every day.
 We look forward to the visits of The
 Sentinel. It is a race for who gets it
 first. Tell us all that is going on; any-
 thing, everything interests us. We all
 send our best wishes. I am, as ever
