Less than two weeks before he was to have quit his job, Glen Scott, a brakeman on the Oregon & South-eastern Railway lost his right hand in an accident at Disston just before noon Tuesday. None of the employees of the railway saw the accident happen, but the giving away of a hand hold allowed him to slip from a car as the train was pulling into the station and his arm at the wrist was crushed by the car wheels. The engine and caboose were used as a special train and the injured man was rushed to this city, where the hand was amputated. He is now resting easily.
