MUST HAVE CERTIFICATE TO BUY REVOLVER

It Is Even Unlawful for Dealers To Display Weapons for Purposes of Sale.

It is now not only unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to sell, barter or give away any revolver or pocket pistol, unless the purchaser is provided with a permit from the proper officer, but it is unlawful for any retail dealer to even display such a weapon for sale, for S. B. 330 has become a law. An exception is made in the bill in favor of policemen, members of the militia and peace officers of the state.

Under the terms of the measure the municipal judge or city recorder of the city or county judge or justice of the peace of the county in which the prospective purchaser resides, may issue the permit when he shall furnish an affidavit from at least two reputable freeholders as to his good moral character. Further, it is provided that dealers engaged in the sale of revolvers and pistols shall keep a record of their sale by registering the name of the purchaser and the number of the weapon. This information is to be transmitted to the sheriff of the county in which the dealer lives on the first and 15th day of each month.

The chief argument advanced for the bill during the session by advocates of the bill was that the indiscriminate sale of this class of weapons was responsible for the greater number of murders committed in the state, and they predict that the law will materially reduce the number of homicides.

Those who opposed the measure contended that there would be no material reduction in the sale and that the bill would cause those desiring weapons of the character covered by it to send to outside dealers for them and deprive the dealers of this state of the profit they would enjoy from their sale. Meeting this objection, those favoring the bill contended that many homicides were committed in the heat of passion or under intoxication, and that the records show that the revolvers with which most of the murders were committed in the past were acquired just before the commission of the crimes. The measure, they asserted, would have the effect of at least preventing homicides of that class.

ARE RAISING WRONG CROPS

Sheep, Hogs and Corn Declared to Be Products Oregon Farms Should Produce.

Declaring that farmers in the Willamette Valley can produce butter 50 per cent cheaper than can be made in New England, and that a pound of pork can be raised for the market for less than it can be raised in the corn regions of the middle west, Professor Thomas Shaw, agricultural expert of the Hill railroad system, told the university students recently that Willamette Valley farmers are growing the wrong kinds of crops.

The Willamette Valley, he said, is the one place in the United States where sheep can be grown to equal those of England. But instead of raising sheep, pork and dairy cattle, the farms of this district, he said, are raising hay, which can not be cut, often, because of rain.

He advocated the cause of dry farming; declaring that the great barren areas of eastern Oregon can by this system be farmable, and, that, with dry farming as is now being practiced in Montana 300,000,000 acres in 14 states that are now barren may be made to raise enormous quantities of wheat. By dry farming, he declared, Montana has increased its wheat crop from 250 carloads to 20,000 carloads.

Unless this lands pressed into this use, the United States has reached its limit in wheat production, he said.

The growing of sweet clover and rape he advocated as profitable crops for Oregon, in the production of sheep, hogs and cattle.

SHOWS DEFECTS IN FARM BUTTER MAKING

Four main defects in farm butter as compared with creamery butter, are pointed out by O. G. Simpson of the dairy school at the Oregon Agricultural College. He says:

"The main defects in farm butter, as compared with creamery butter, are bad flavor, staleness or rancidity, too many shades of color, and unsuitable packages. The flavor is of the highest importance, and no matter how good the butter is in other respect, if the flavor is wrong it is classed as an inferior article."

"No matter how skillful the butter maker is, it is impossible for him to make a strictly first class butter out of poorly flavored or tainted cream. Cream may become tainted from four causes: bacterial infection, absorption of flavors, food eaten, or disease in the cow. The bacterial infection may come of unclean cows and stables, unclean condition of milkers, unclean utensils, or keeping the cream in unclean surroundings, especially in a temperature above 60 degrees."

"Absorption of flavors takes place with remarkable rapidity when milk or cream is allowed to stand in an atmosphere where odors are present, especially when the milk is warm."

"Foods that have strong tastes and odors, such as onions, decayed silage, old staly kale or turnip tops should not be fed within a few hours of milking. Experiments have shown that milk will not possess the flavors of such foods if not drawn for eight or twelve hours after feeding. Cows that are abnormally heated or excited before milking give a tainted milk. Many diseases also affect the cow's milk."

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New Cook Book Has 166 Tested Recipes.

The new cook book for the freshman classes at the Oregon Agricultural College just issued by Dean H. W.

Calvin contains 166 tested recipes, and has a very complete index.

The recipe for strawberry shortcake is of particular interest at this time. It is given in small quantity, which can be increased as desired, and is as follows: 1 box strawberries, sugar to sweeten, 1/2 cup flour, 2 1/2 tablespoons butter, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1 teaspoon sugar, a speck of salt, milk enough to make a soft dough, 2 tablespoons of pulverized sugar, and 1/2 cup of whipped cream.

Sift the salt, teaspoonful of sugar, flour and baking powder, and cut in 1 1/2 tablespoons of butter. Add the milk, roll 1/2 inch thick and bake. Split open while it is hot and butter both split sides. Cover the bottom piece with well sweetened, crushed strawberries and place the upper portion on it. Arrange whole berries on the top, sprinkle with pulverized sugar and garnish with whipped cream.
