C. F. HANDY HITS ON HEAD WHEN HORSE TAKES FRIGHT AT AUTO

Machine Driven Over Pile of Lumber and Picket Fence to Avoid Runaway Animal.

While coming into the city with a load of berries yesterday afternoon, C. F. Handy was thrown from his rig onto his head and seriously injured when the horse became frightened by the big Maxwell car from the Neamith Garage being tried out by Head Mechanic Bob Roak.

The horse then swung clear around in the road and took after the car that had passed, nearly climbing into the car, catching a wheel in the car and tearing himself loose from the harness.

Capt. J. C. Johnson and O. E. Woodson were passengers in the car. Mr. Woodson states that Mr. Handy had driven into the summer road to allow the machine to pass and that the horse showed no signs of fright until the machine was within ten feet of him.

In attempting to avoid the frightened animal the chauffeur drove the machine over a pile of lumber and a picket fence. Mr. Woodson does not believe either the driver of the machine or of horse can be blamed for the accident.
