H. E. Gibler shipped two cars of wood to Eugene Tuesday.

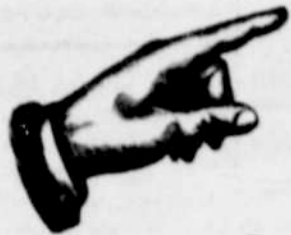

Creswell, Ore., June 4.—(Register Lane County Special.)—The commercial club held its regular meeting last evening at the club rooms, and a large delegation from the Ladies' Civic Improvement League was present. After the usual routine of business the meeting was addressed by the guest of the evening, Elbert Bede, editor of the Cottage Grove Sentinel, who gave a very practical talk on the subject of "Helping One Another."

He introduced his subject by showing how cities, states and even nations could not live unto themselves, but are dependent upon each other and if that

relationship can be maintained in good fellowship and a spirit of helpfulness, the largest results are obtained. He expressed the benefit derived from cooperation of the towns people and the farmers and demonstrated the fact by the successful cooperation of the Cottage Grove Commercial club is having with the farmers in the vicinity.
