Construction Work on Second Story to Armory Is Matter of Week or So.

WITH SLIVERS IN BRAIN HE HOLDS ONTO LIFE

Man Falls, Spike Drives Piece of Skull Into Brain; Wood Enters Opening.

The injury of Charles Jones at the construction of the steel bridge last week was one of the most remarkable cases. Mr. Jones was assisting in placing some of the steel girders for the span next this end, and was trying to lift a large piece of the steel with a peavey, when the latter slipped as he was lifting and he fell over backward and down a distance of 18 feet and struck with his head a large timber into which a large spike had been partly driven. A section of the skull about an inch and a half in diameter was broken out and pressed into the brain, and as he turned over two large splinters of wood four inches long and an inch wide were driven into the brain right through the hole made by the spike for their full length. The attending surgeon, Dr. Scieffe, could not pull them out, as when he attempted to do so they wedged themselves against the broken portion of the skull and the edge from which it was broken so he had to remove the broken part first and then pull out the slivers of wood, which he has saved. A peculiar feature of the case is the fact that the man did not lose consciousness from the time he was hurt and after the anaesthetic he was as rational as ever and has continued to remain so, nor has he suffered any paralysis. The only symptoms he has that he is so badly hurt, is that he is quite a good deal depressed in spirits. If he recovers, it will be contrary to all medical precedents.—Register.

WATER RATES ARE BEING CHECKED UP

Complete Data Being Gathered From Which to Place Department on Business Basis.

G. G. Warner is engaged for the city this week checking up water users and making a complete report of all taps, etc. This work is being done for the purpose of equalizing all rates and putting the department on a business basis. It is the first time data has been prepared from which a complete adjustment could be made.

A complete schedule of rates was adopted at the last monthly meeting of the city council, but these rates will affect few but large users except where taps are in use that are not being charged for.

The only radical change of rates in is in those charged manufacturing establishments.
