Carter was wanted at Portland on a warrant charging him with a crime against two young girls. A postal card written from here by Carter was intercepted at Portland and the deputy sheriff put on the lookout. He got information that a man answering the description had been seen riding a blind mule into the Martin Creek country and the officer started after him. The deputy sheriff arrived early in the morning while the fugitive was packing his belongings for another flight.

An officer arrived from Portland Thursday night and took Carter in charge.

The School Building Muddle

In connection with the proposed new building is as members of the building committee, where the other members take equal responsibility. As directors they are instructed as to what the district wishes them to do and the taxpayers assume the responsibility for such action if their wishes are carried out. In an affair such as this it is nice to know what the people want.

The last paragraph of the resolution was introduced with the knowledge and at the request of Director Jones. The resolution carried by a vote of 66 to 32. Mr. Jones had nothing to do with wording the resolution, but a few hours after it was passed, and in the presence of witnesses, he expressed his approval. A moment later he explained to a member of the advisory board that The Sentinel had gotten him into trouble and now had gotten him out again. At the meeting of the combined building committee that same evening he said he felt relieved of all responsibility if overruled by a majority of the building committee and would resign his position as director if there were not other duties than the erection of the school building. He has been highly complimented for such action by many who spoke bitterly of him before.

On the Saturday night following the election Director Jones, having been relieved of his former obligation, recommended for the school board Russell & Vincent of Eugene, who had not yet submitted plans. Members of the advisory board asked until the next Saturday night to investigate.

It would have relieved the situation entirely for the time if the advisory board had seen fit to recommend Russell & Vincent, but on Saturday night, after investigation, all members of the advisory board, together with A. L. Woodard, the newly elected director, recommended J. R. Ford (the firm of Ford & Ragdale having been dissolved), providing a suitable contract could be made. Although opposed to Mr. Ford, Director Jones, feeling himself bound by the resolution passed by the taxpayers, moved that the school board ratify the selection upon the condition named. Director Woodard voted with him and the motion prevailed. The meeting then adjourned until the next Monday night.

The proceedings of the next Monday night were fully published in The Sentinel last week. Mr. Ford was present with a contract which was acceptable to all members of the advisory board and to Director Woodard. Director Jones was not present. Chairman King held that it was necessary for the school board to act upon the contract to make it legal, but refused to say when he would call a directors' meeting, upon the grounds that there was certain information he wanted before doing so.

Since that time Mr. King has received a set of plans from Russell & Vincent, and he thereafter immediately called a school board meeting for the coming Saturday at 10 a. m. for their consideration, and it is probable that it was this set of plans he wished before calling a meeting.

Chairman King now says he does not believe the voters meant what they said and that they still wish the whole matter left to the school board.

"I believe I am just as competent as any member of the advisory committee, or the whole advisory committee for that matter, in the erection of a school building, and if there is dissatisfaction with my action I am willing to take the chances of a recall." Those are Mr. King's words. He in fact professes that he would welcome a recall election as giving him an opportunity to show up the opposition.

Last Saturday forenoon Director Jones still maintained in a telephone conversation with The Sentinel that he stood ready to endorse the action of a majority of the building committee. That same afternoon, however, he was visited by Director King, who induced him to endorse a public statement proposed by King. This statement gives the impression that Mr. Jones has changed his mind for some reason or other and that at the school meeting Saturday he will again recommend Russell & Vincent and that with the vote of Chairman King the school board will elect the architects against the judgment of a majority of the building committee, and despite the motion already adopted to ratify the action of that majority.

A little light might be given at this point as to the enmity against the selection of the advisory board and this is something not generally known. The gentleman who claimed the job of architect by right of a political obligation is a life-long friend of Mr. Jones and he is also a political enemy of the architect selected by the advisory board. Mr. Jones might not be particularly blamed for wishing to help a friend get a job, but he should not take up a friend's enemies. He may not be doing so, but there is such a suspicion. This suspicion was alloyed by his action at the last meeting at which he was present, but his signed statement brings it out anew.

Have they more confidence in Chambers, Shinn, DeLong and Woodard on one side, or in King and Jones on the other side. Chairman King, however, claims the resolution was a job, is ambiguous, contains a joker, and that the voters did not know what they were doing. Both boards are the creation of the people, and should, therefore, bow to the wishes of the people. If there is any room for doubt as to what those who created them wish them to do, let's vote on the proposition again if there is yet time and have the issue clear cut. Let's leave no room for misunderstanding. Let's have an expression of the will of the taxpayers one way or the other that can not be twisted or misconstrued, by either side.

King says he will never give in. The four opposed to him are probably equally determined. King probably has the school law with him and says a majority of the taxpayers are with him, but the others believe they have the majority of taxpayers with them. The muddle is such that the taxpayers should have another opportunity to speak.

If the entire building committee had been composed of men none of whom were members of the school board, the duties of the two boards might be plain. Maybe there is yet time to take some such action. An entirely new committee might be wise.
