AGAIN EASY VICTIM FOR LOCALS IS EUGENE

Seventh Inning Is Fatal to Visiting Team

Before Large Crowd Cottage Grove Eases It Into County Seat for Second Time Within Thirty Days.

Before a Fourth of July crowd of a thousand or more the Grove team added another victory to the unbroken string of games won on the local grounds. For the second time within a month Eugene was the victim. Both teams gave the best they had and it looked like an even break in the run getting up to the lucky seventh. In this inning Dobie, who had kept the hits well scattered took the aeroplane route and when he again came to earth he had seven hits and four runs scratched against his offerings, making a total of fifteen hits and seven corners, putting the game away in cold storage for the Grovers.

This is how it happened: Earl led off with a three-bagger but perished trying to stretch it to a homer. Alexander to Dobie to Rolfe; McGee doubled, Hanks connected with one bearing a tag for four corners (Alexander whistled for his bird dog to retrieve this one), scoring McGee ahead of him; Wagers singled, Glass fled to center, Wicks singled, moving Wagers over to third, Wright singled, scoring Wagers, Cellars doubled scoring Wicks, Smith floated one to first which Sterner glued to his fingers, ending the fireworks.
