NEW TRACT IS CONSIDERED FOR HITCH RACKS

Delay Arises in Purchase of Electric Fire Alarm System.—Storm Sewer Ordered.

At the regular council meeting Tuesday evening the property of Fred Affolter, located at the north end of North Seventh Street, was decided upon as the most suitable piece offered as a site for the hitching racks. Mr. Affolter asks a consideration of \$1700. The committee was instructed to look into ways and means for financing the scheme.

Delay has arisen in the purchasing of the new fire alarm system because of the wish of the council to investigate still another system which has been called to its attention.

A committee was appointed to investigate the possibilities of the building of a new bridge on Main Street, and another committee was appointed to look into the advisability of extending the water main up to Chambers' mill, the lumber company to pay \$20 a month for stand-pipe only, which would be used for fire protection.

The Cottage Grove Electric Light Company protested that its water rate was exorbitant, but the protest was not allowed.

Mr. Kidd asked permission to put a new roof on his livery stable but the motion to that effect received no second.

On a motion the extension of the storm sewer on West Main Street was ordered as a means of protecting the streets now being improved.

To Raise Ducks.

County Game Warden L. E. Bean has made the first move toward stocking the waters of Oregon with ducks. He has four settings of Muscovy duck eggs that have been donated to the state by the veteran sportsman James Fullerton. These ducks are very large and of beautiful plumage and as they are naturally wild will be a great addition to the game birds of the state. They are very prolific and if not molested for five years will be found in large numbers throughout the valley.
