KEEP VOTING AND NO NEED TO RE-REGISTER

New Registration Law Eliminates Considerable Red Tape and Makes Some Confusion.

Voters who register and vote in the same precinct at every general election following such registration, will not be required to re-register, according to the new registration law.

Heretofore voters have had to register for every election. Hereafter they will only have to register after failing to vote at an election or because of removal from one precinct to another. For example: If a voter registers now in First precinct, Cottage Grove, and votes at the next general election he will not need to register for the following election, but if he then fails to vote at an election he will have to re-register for the next election and can continue to vote without re-registering until he again fails to vote. All voters will have to register for the coming election, however, as this law was not in force at the time of the recent election. It is anticipated that considerable confusion will result from this new law. Registrations will hereafter be taken by registration clerks, of which there will be one in each precinct. This will result in some confusion in Cottage Grove on account of the change in the city's boundary lines.

AUTOMOBILES COLLIDE BUT NO ONE INJURED

What might have been a serious accident occurred Friday evening when the Burkholder and England autos collided while turning the First National Bank corner and going in opposite directions. The Brund machine was passing at the same time, but missed the collision. All machines were moving slowly or the results would have been more serious. The lamps on the England machine were smashed but the Burkholder car was not damaged. Some of the occupants were thrown out of their seats and badly scared but no one was injured.
