OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

Sand in Water Kills Cows
Bend.—Sand as an enemy of the dairyman has just been discovered by a Powell Butte rancher. A fine dairy cow of his died suddenly and to determine the cause of her death he made an examination and found that there was nearly a quart of fine sand between the second and third stomachs. The cow had been drinking from shallow irrigation ditches, and the light pumice sand had been so abundant in the water as to accumulate and cause death. Fine dairy stock previously lost by other farmers is now believed to have died also from the same cause.

Crawford Makes Ruling
Marshfield.—Attorney General Crawford, in a written opinion sent to Judge Pennock, of Marshfield, holds that registration clerks, under the new law, cannot register voters in other precincts than the one in which they are appointed. The new law requires the registration clerks to give bond for \$300 for the faithful performance of their duties.

PATROL GOES TO TIMBER

Six Hundred Watchers to Be in Service During Next Six Hot Weeks
Salem.—With the arrival of warm, dry weather hundreds of forest patrolmen are being sent into the timber districts to keep a lookout for forest fires. State Forester Elliott states that over 600 men will patrol the forests of the state during August. This will be the largest number ever used in this service.

The state forester is now appointing the federal patrolmen, whose salaries and expenses are paid by the government under the provisions of the Weeks law. There will be 60 of them. One or more will be placed in every county west of the Cascades, and one in every county east of the Cascades which has sufficient timber to warrant it. The state force consists of 27 men, a portion of whose salaries and expenses is paid by the forest fire association. The other 500 or 600 men will be the patrolmen hired by the associations.

Boast Gets Him Behind Bars.
Roseburg.—Charles Howard of Edenbow, who is under bonds for alleged bootlegging was arrested on a charge of contempt of court. He boasted, it is said, that he could buy intoxicating liquor at 14 places in Roseburg, which is a dry town. When called before the grand jury he said it was true he could buy booze but he refused to name the places. He was fined \$25 and ordered held in jail until he consented to tell.

Exiled Editor Will Return
Salem.—Declaring that he was kidnapped and taken from Bandon, Dr. Bailey K. Leach, Socialist speaker and publisher, announced in an address here that he would return to that city in several weeks. He said he would resume the publication of his paper on his return.

BLUE SKY LAW IS REACHING

Statute Applies to All Companies With Securities to Sell.
Salem.—Corporation Commissioner Watson has announced that all companies with stocks or bonds to sell, even though they are not offered at the present time, come within the purview of the blue sky law. He said that the only investment companies that are exempt are those that have issued and sold all their securities. All companies, he holds, that have stocks or securities not contracted for prior to June 3 must live up to the provisions of the bill.

Klamath Opposes Revision
Klamath Falls.—The proposed federal legislation which would close the season for duck hunting December 15, instead of February 15, as provided by the state law, would cut out much of the best part of the hunting season in this region. The Klamath Sportsmen's association has taken the matter in hand and will press objections to the undesirable features.

Ships 100 Cars of Strawberries
Hood River.—The strawberry shipping season has come to a close in the Hood River valley and the records of the Apple Growers' association show that 109 car loads have left Hood River this season, which is the largest number of cars that have ever been shipped from this point.

Aphis Attacks Young Orchards
Monmouth.—Polk county's young orchards of cherries and pears are again being molested with green aphis. The tiny pests appear on the ends of the smallest limbs and do damage to such an extent that the leaves curl up. Cherry trees especially are having a hard year for their foliage growth.

BALLOONIST LEAPS TO DEATH

Parachute Jumper Dies in First Aeroplane Drop

Seattle.—Francis L. Thayer, aged 47 years, a parachute jumper, known throughout the west, was drowned while making a parachute descent from an aeroplane as part of the Potlatch air sports.

He went up in an aeroplane with Johnny Bryant. At a height of 750 feet he dropped from the aeroplane. After a descent of 100 feet he broke loose from the parachute and fell to the water.

Thayer did not rise to the surface after going into the water. He had been giving parachute exhibitions 25 years. Thayer called Chicago his home. He leaves a widow, in Seattle, and relatives at Aberdeen, Wash.

Liquors To Be Seized

Salem, Or.—Governor West has issued a proclamation instructing peace officers to seize all intoxicating liquors shipped into the state in violation of federal and state laws.

"It is daily brought to the attention of this office," says the proclamation, "that unlawful shipments of such liquor are being made, particularly by means of ocean and river steamers plying between points within this state and points within this and other states."

REVOLT IN CHINA GROWS ALARMING

Pekin.—The Chinese government is still dispatching troops to subdue the revolutionary movement in the disaffected southern provinces, but has not withdrawn any soldiers from Mongolia.

President Yuan Shi Kai is anxious to proceed south to lead his troops, but his associates have persuaded him to remain in Peking, for fear that he might be assassinated on the way to the scene of hostilities.

It is now generally believed that General Sun Yat Sen, former provisional president of the republic, who has taken sides with the southerners and who is now at Nanking, and General Huang Sing, former generalissimo of the revolutionary army, never intended to support President Yuan Shi Kai permanently, but only to use him to bring the revolution to a successful end.

Bulgaria Not to Make Resistance
London.—Any idea that the Bulgarian army is preparing for a counter stroke has been abandoned. It has become known that in his anxiety to bring about peace, King Ferdinand appealed to the German emperor regarding Rumania's action. The nature of the emperor's reply has not been disclosed.

A semi-official dispatch from Sofia says that even should the Rumanians invade the capital no resistance would be offered.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

The president has set aside 2440 acres in Klamath county for entry under the enlarged homestead act.

Senator Chamberlain has accepted an invitation to deliver the principal address before the United Irish societies in Chicago August 18.

Fifteen permits for the construction of reservoirs in the state at an estimated cost of \$1,492,600, were issued by the state engineer during the quarter ending June 30.

The citizens of Madras have organized a fair association, and will hold the first annual fair and livestock exhibit in Madras on October 16, 17, and 18.

While playing with a small target rifle at Baker, Gerald Moody, the 9-year-old son of Orson Moody, a wealthy sheepman, was accidentally shot through the head and instantly killed.

The first conference ever held for church ministers of all denominations in Oregon will take place at the University of Oregon during the week of July 21 to 27.

By unanimous consent the senate passed a bill making Oregon lands which had been withdrawn or classified as oil lands subject to entry under the homestead or desert land law.

Application has been received by the comptroller of the currency for permission to convert the State bank of Redmond into the First National Bank of Redmond, with a capital of \$25,000.

Professor C. J. Bushnell has resigned as head of the sociological department of Lawrence college at Appleton, Wis., an old Methodist institution, to become president of Pacific university of Forest Grove.

To prevent the necessity of having to remove a number of old soldiers from the Soldiers' home at Roseburg, the state board of control raised the pension limit over which veterans will not be admitted from \$20 a month to \$30.

According to an announcement made by Assistant State Superintendent of Public Instruction Carlton, 1800 teachers took the recent examination. This is the largest number to take an examination in the history of the state.

It does not matter what the amount of a widow's salary or wages is, if she has children depending upon her for support and has no other income aside from her wages, she is eligible to the benefits of the widow's pension law, according to an opinion given by the attorney general.

Senator Chamberlain will take up with the secretary of the interior a petition from the residents and citizens of the Grand Ronde Indian reservation and vicinity to replace present police system with one competent man to do police duty and look after old and infirm Indians.

A mortgage of \$800,000 has been filed at Eugene which covers nearly 32,000 acres of timber along the National extension. It was given by the Penn Timber company of Warren, Pa., to the Detroit Trust company, and is taken to indicate the early construction of a large sawmill.

Marshall and Hick Lockett were indicted at a special session of the grand jury at Baker, and their bail is fixed at \$8500. They are accused of stealing thousands of dollars worth of cattle from eastern Oregon ranges, and if they are convicted, Sheriff Kerfoot will receive a reward of \$2000.

According to a statement made at Salem by Governor West, 16 cents a day for three meals, or a little over five cents a meal, is the average daily cost to the state of Oregon for feeding its employees and prisoners at the penitentiary. At this small cost, he says, an abundance of food of a good quality is provided.

R. L. Harrison of the state engineers' force, has started a survey of the Clackamas river to determine the fall and topography of the banks as a means of ascertaining the value of the stream for water power purposes. During this season he will take up a similar survey of the Sandy, Hood, Santiam and McKenzie rivers.

The senate passed Senator Chamberlain's bill authorizing the state of Oregon to exchange 40,000 acres of school sections in forest reserves for a compact body of land in the Santiam reserve, not exceeding 40,000 acres in area, which land shall be held by the state for a permanent state reserve.

A dozen men will be sent to Tillamook county to spread poisoned grain over an area of 2000 acres and kill field mice, gophers and other rodent pests that might destroy the seeds of Douglas fir to be planted there this summer. This arrangement has been made at Eugene by A. E. Cahoon, supervisor of the Siuslaw national forest.

Although the law which required commission merchants to obtain state licenses and puts them under the regulation of the state railroad commission, has been operative more than a month, only one concern has obtained a license. The object of the law was the protection of farmers and fruit-growers and many have asked the railroad commission why the law is not enforced.
