John Hampton was up from Eugene over Sunday visiting at the G. H. Tyson home.

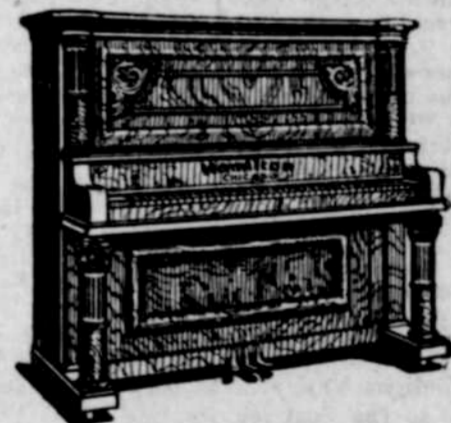
