FAILS TO HEED INSPECTOR AND PAYS \$25 FINE FOR OFFENSE

apples in the bottom of a box at the store which were affected with scab and Mr. Metcalf's arrest followed.

One prominent grocer, discussing the action of the fruit inspector today, said: "If we are going to be compelled to make a minute examination of every apple that we buy of the farmers or of the fruit growers' association to see if any of them have a little speck of scab it will mean a prohibitive price to be paid by the consumers. We cannot afford to do that. I think the fruit inspector is stretching a point when he arrests a grocer for selling apples that to all appearances are perfectly healthy, but which to an expert appear to be diseased. Now these apples you see there," pointing to a box of as fine looking early apples as ever grew, "look to be free from disease, but if I offer them for sale I am liable to arrest, and fine, according to this inspector's ruling, for some of them have little spots on them. I think it is unjust and unfair."

This grocer said that Inspector Stewart yesterday afternoon entered Mr. Metcalf's store unknown to him, bought some of the apples he had for sale and immediately had him arrested. The dealers held a meeting this afternoon and talked over the situation and were agreed that this was unfair. The inspector should give warning and if the law was then violated, it was time to make arrests, they declare.

Mr. Stewart informs The Sentinel that the Eugene dealers, Mr. Metcalf in particular, had been repeatedly warned and that there was no excuse whatever for the attempt to sell the apples for which the arrest followed. The fruit, Mr. Stewart states, was in such bad shape that a blind man could almost detect the flaws.

That nothing unfair is being asked by the inspector is demonstrated at Cottage Grove, where no attempt is made to put anything over on the inspector. It is not likely that any more trouble will occur at Eugene now that it has been learned that the inspector means just what he says when he states that no diseased fruit can be sold in this county.

rich deposit of free gold ore and that the agreement stated that he was to show the location of the ore; that he was to have 25 per cent of the net proceeds of all ore taken out; that the defendant was to start on the ore deposit and to mill and remove and reduce ore carrying \$10 or more per ton net, the plaintiff to receive the 25 per cent till he should have received the sum of \$5,000, then the contract was to end.

Mr. Leigh says that the company worked the ore but did not pay him and now threatens to sell the property. He asks the court to issue an injunction forbidding the sale until the company makes an accounting with him.

NEW STEEL BRIDGE IN 60 DAYS

Construction of the steel bridge over the Coast Fork at the north end of Ninth Street will begin at once. The contract was let yesterday by the County Court. A. C. U. Berry of Portland was the successful bidder, his figure being \$2,800. The structure is to be completed in 60 days. It will be of modern steel type on concrete piers. It will consist of one 80 foot span, 18 feet wide. A unique feature of the bids opened was that the winning bid was scarcely more than one-third of the highest bid. Five other bids were received: Atlas Bridge company, \$4,000; Coast Bridge company, \$3,500; L. N. Roney, \$3,900; Ambrose-Burdal company, \$6,358; Milwaukee Bridge company, \$4,800.

This bridge does not replace any other bridge and its construction was sought about largely through the Commercial Club to secure a good highway into the city for automobilists, many of whom now go around the city and see only the West Side.
