## A SOCIETY WITH A MISSION.

HERE ARE so many societies with high sounding names whose energy seems to be spent in the annual election of officers and a few semi-social sessions, that it is a wholesome pleasure to come in contact with one having a well-defined mission and one securing results along the line of its endeavor.

Such an organization is The Oregon Social Hygiene Society, and its mission is the rearing of healthy men and women and the stamping out of immorality and venereal disease.

A worthier object than that there is not. No one can read any one of the many free pamphlets distributed by this society without securing information of inestimable value. No one can attend one of the lectures given under the auspices of this society without the same result.

No father should allow his boy to pass through the period of self-consciousness without giving him the information contained in pamphlets issued for this situation by the society.

No mother should allow her daughter to reach the age of puberty ignorant of the vital information the pamphlets contain that may save many a girl a life of misery.

Other pamphlets contain surprising information for parents, present and prospective.

We make the following brief quotations to indicate the value of study of the complete pamphlets from which these quotations are made:

Self-control is a mark of manliness and not of effeminacy. Abstinence from impurity develops strength and courage. A boy should take no liberties with any girl that he would not have another boy take with his own sister, and a boy that would even suggest to a girl any step that he knew might later lead to her downfall, while his reputation remained unhurt, is a base coward. As a proposition of fair play, demand of yourself the same standard of purity you expect in your sister and girl friends.

When a girl accepts a man's courtship with marriage in view, she usually knows something about his social, financial and business standing. She also has a right to know his physical condition, especially as regards his sexual health. A girl contemplating marriage should require that her intended husband present satisfactory evidence of freedom from venereal disease. She may have unbounded faith in his good character, and he may appear an ideal man, but neither of these is a guaranty that he is free from infection. She had far better remain single than marry a man who may convey his disease to her and to her children, with all the suffering that attends it. Many such marriages as this end in the divorce courts; but because of the shame the reason is seldom made public.

What a child inherits by birth determines whether it will be easy for him to live right or wrong. To have the elements of a good character, and a body and mind free from disease, should be the birthright of every child.
