Watson, who jumped a board bill at Drain, there are now five inmates of the county jail.—Roseburg Review.

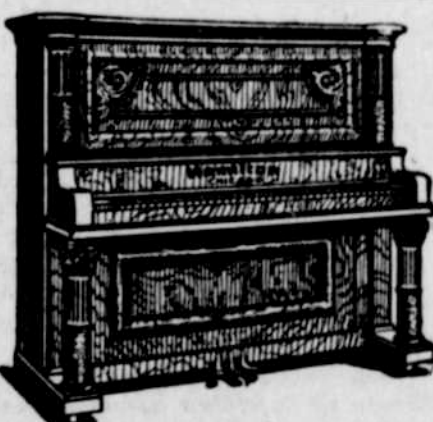
That the plain common potato can be turned into a money paying industry by manufacturing the surplus crop in alcohol, starch, glucose and desiccated potato, is the announcement made by C. C. Moore, assistant chemist in the United States Bureau of Chemistry who was a visitor at the Portland Commercial Club last week. Mr. Moore is on a tour investigating the potato production of Oregon with a view of securing information as to what is being done with the surplus tuber. Approximately 600,000 tons of glucose is consumed in the United States a year and 10,000 tons or more is the demand of the Pacific Coast states. Practically there is no starch or glucose factory on the coast, Mr. Moore explained, and the department is desirous of encouraging the industry. That this is a manufacturing enterprise of considerable dividend paying is plainly shown by Mr. Moore's figures, that between \$500,000 to \$750,000 is sent annually in to the corn belt for this product.
